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# INTRODUCTION

# PROJECT OVERVIEW

This Community Health Needs Assessment, a follow-up to similar studies conducted in 2002, 2005, 2010, 2013, and 2018, is a systematic, data-driven approach to determining the health status, behaviors, and needs of residents in Avoyelles Parish as part of a larger study conducted by The Rapides Foundation. Subsequently, this information may be used to inform decisions and guide efforts to improve community health and wellness.

A Community Health Needs Assessment provides information so that communities may identify issues of greatest concern and decide to commit resources to those areas, thereby making the greatest possible impact on community health status.

This assessment was conducted on behalf of The Rapides Foundation by PRC, a nationally recognized health care consulting firm with extensive experience conducting Community Health Needs Assessments in hundreds of communities across the United States since 1994.

## Methodology

This assessment incorporates data from multiple sources, including primary research (through the PRC Community Health Survey and PRC Online Key Informant Survey), as well as secondary research (vital statistics and other existing health-related data). It also allows for trending and comparison to benchmark data at the state and national levels.

### PRC Community Health Survey

#### Survey Instrument

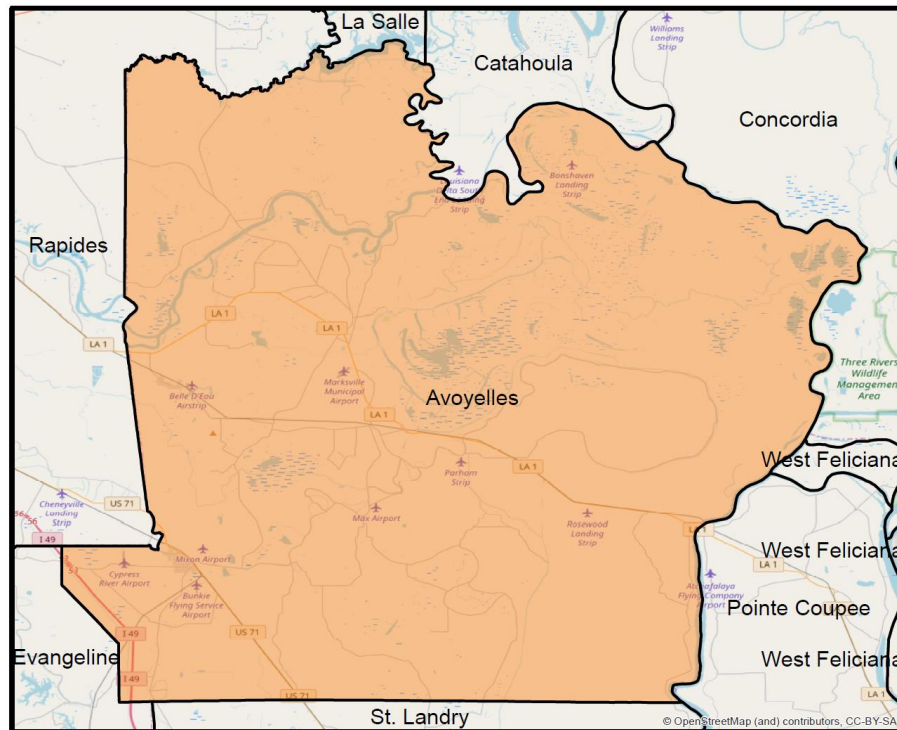
The survey instrument used for this study is based largely on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), as well as various other public health surveys and customized questions addressing gaps in indicator data relative to health promotion and disease prevention objectives and other recognized health issues. The final survey instrument was developed by The Rapides Foundation and PRC and is similar to the previous surveys used in the region, allowing for data trending.

#### Community Defined for This Assessment

The focus of the data presented in this report is Avoyelles Parish, Louisiana.







## Sample Approach & Design

A precise and carefully executed methodology is critical in asserting the validity of the results gathered in the PRC Community Health Survey. Thus, to ensure the best representation of the population surveyed a mixed-mode methodology was implemented. This included surveys conducted via telephone (landline and cell phone), as well as through online questionnaires.

The sample design used for this effort consisted of a random sample of 233 individuals age 18 and older in Avoyelles Parish. All administration of the surveys, data collection, and data analysis was conducted by PRC.

For statistical purposes, the maximum rate of error associated with a sample size of 233 respondents is  $\pm 6.9\%$  at the 95 percent confidence level.

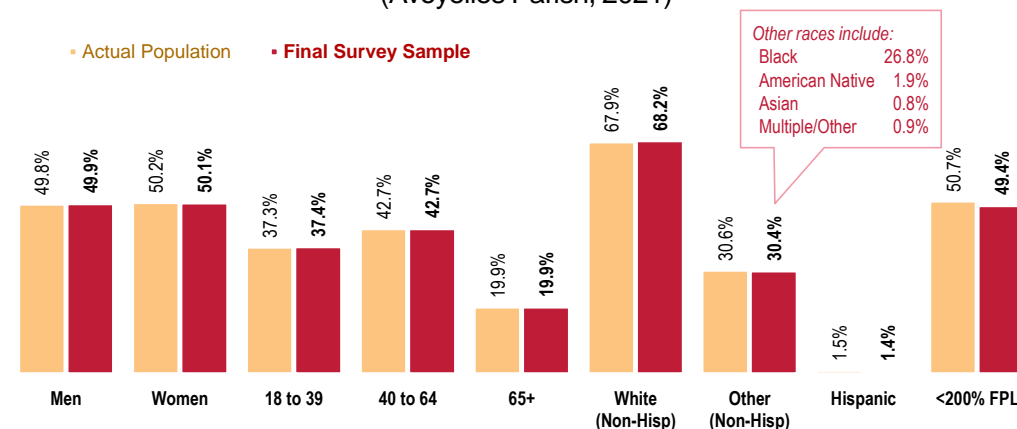
## Sample Characteristics

To accurately represent the population studied, PRC strives to minimize bias through application of a proven telephone methodology and random-selection techniques. While this random sampling of the population produces a highly representative sample, it is a common and preferred practice to “weight” the raw data to improve this representativeness even further. This is accomplished by adjusting the results of a random sample to match the geographic distribution and demographic characteristics of the population surveyed (poststratification), so as to eliminate any naturally occurring bias.

The following chart outlines the characteristics of the Avoyelles Parish sample for key demographic variables, compared to actual population characteristics revealed in census data. [Note that the sample consisted solely of area residents age 18 and older; data on children were given by proxy by the person most responsible for that child’s health care needs, and these children are not represented demographically in this chart.]

The sample design and the quality control procedures used in the data collection ensure that the sample is representative. Thus, the findings may be generalized to the total population of community members in the defined area with a high degree of confidence.

### INCOME & RACE/ETHNICITY

**INCOME** ► Poverty descriptions and segmentation used in this report are based on administrative poverty thresholds determined by the US Department of Health & Human Services. These guidelines define poverty status by household income level and number of persons in the household (e.g., the 2021 guidelines place the poverty threshold for a family of four at \$26,500 annual household income or lower). In sample segmentation: “low income” refers to community members living in a household with defined poverty status or living just above the poverty level, earning up to twice (<200% of) the poverty threshold; “mid/high income” refers to those households living on incomes which are twice or more (≥200% of) the federal poverty level.

**RACE & ETHNICITY** ► In analyzing survey results, mutually exclusive race and ethnicity categories are used “White” reflects non-Hispanic White respondents; “Communities of Color” includes Hispanics and non-White race groups. While the survey data are representative of the racial and ethnic makeup of the population, the samples for Hispanic and non-White race groups were not of sufficient size for independent analysis.

### Online Key Informant Survey

To solicit input from key informants, those individuals who have a broad interest in the health of the community, an Online Key Informant Survey also was implemented as part of this process. A list of recommended participants was provided by The Rapides Foundation; this list included names and contact information for physicians, public health representatives, other health professionals, social service providers, and a variety of other community leaders. Potential participants were chosen because of their ability to identify primary concerns of the populations with whom they work, as well as of the community overall.



Key informants were contacted by email, introducing the purpose of the survey and providing a link to take the survey online; reminder emails were sent as needed to increase participation. In all, four community stakeholders in Avoyelles Parish took part in the Online Key Informant Survey. Final participation included representatives of the organizations in the following list:

Through this process, input was gathered from several individuals whose organizations work with low-income, minority, or other medically underserved populations.

In the online survey, key informants were asked to rate the degree to which various health issues are a problem in their own community. Follow-up questions asked them to describe why they identify problem areas as such and how these might better be addressed. Results of their ratings, as well as their verbatim comments, are included throughout this report as they relate to the various other data presented.

NOTE ► These findings represent qualitative rather than quantitative data. The Online Key Informant Survey was designed to gather input regarding participants' opinions and perceptions of the health needs of the residents in the area.

## Public Health, Vital Statistics & Other Data

## Benchmark Data

*NOTE: The benchmark data described below represent data collected prior to the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic that began in March 2020. It is important to keep this in mind when referencing comparisons to these data; some current indicators for the parish (especially those with a shorter look-back period [e.g., in the past year]) might be impacted by pandemic-related factors not represented in the benchmark data.*

### Trending

Similar surveys were administered in Avoyelles Parish in 2002, 2005, 2010, 2013, and 2018 by PRC on behalf of The Rapides Foundation. Trending data, as revealed by comparison to prior survey results, are provided throughout this report whenever available. Historical data for secondary data indicators are also included for the purposes of trending.

### Regional Risk Factor Data

Regional risk factor data are provided from the broader nine-parish assessment for The Rapides Foundation Service Area (RFSA), of which this assessment is part. The regional RFSA data reflect data for Allen, Avoyelles, Catahoula, Grant, LaSalle, Natchitoches, Rapides, Vernon, and Winn Parishes in Central Louisiana.

### Louisiana Risk Factor Data

Statewide risk factor data are provided where available as an additional benchmark against which to compare local survey findings; these data represent the most recent *BRFSS (Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System) Prevalence and Trends Data* published online by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. State-level vital statistics are also provided for comparison of secondary data indicators.

### Nationwide Risk Factor Data

Nationwide risk factor data, which are also provided in comparison charts, are taken from the *2020 PRC National Health Survey*; the methodological approach for the national study is similar to that employed in this assessment, and these data may be generalized to the US population with a high degree of confidence. National-level vital statistics are also provided for comparison of secondary data indicators.

### Healthy People 2030

Healthy People provides 10-year, measurable public health objectives — and tools to help track progress toward achieving them. Healthy People identifies public health priorities to help individuals, organizations, and communities across the United States improve health and well-being. Healthy People 2030, the initiative's fifth iteration, builds on knowledge gained over the first four decades.



Healthy People 2030's overarching goals are to:

- Attain healthy, thriving lives and well-being free of preventable disease, disability, injury, and premature death.
- Eliminate health disparities, achieve health equity, and attain health literacy to improve the health and well-being of all.
- Create social, physical, and economic environments that promote attaining the full potential for health and well-being for all.
- Promote healthy development, healthy behaviors, and well-being across all life stages.
- Engage leadership, key constituents, and the public across multiple sectors to take action and design policies that improve the health and well-being of all.

The Healthy People 2030 framework was based on recommendations made by the Secretary's Advisory Committee on National Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Objectives for 2030. After getting





feedback from individuals and organizations and input from subject matter experts, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) approved the framework which helped guide the selection of Healthy People 2030 objectives.

## Information Gaps

While this assessment is quite comprehensive, it cannot measure all possible aspects of health in the community, nor can it adequately represent all possible populations of interest. It must be recognized that these information gaps might in some ways limit the ability to assess all of the community's health needs.

For example, certain population groups — such as the homeless, institutionalized persons, or those who only speak a language other than English or Spanish — are not represented in the survey data. Other population groups — for example, pregnant women, lesbian/gay/bisexual/ transgender residents, undocumented residents, and members of certain racial/ethnic or immigrant groups — might not be identifiable or might not be represented in numbers sufficient for independent analyses.

In terms of content, this assessment was designed to provide a comprehensive and broad picture of the health of the overall community. However, there are certainly medical conditions that are not specifically addressed.



# SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

## Key Data Findings

This summary presents key findings from the data collected for Avoyelles Parish for the 2021 Community Health Needs Assessment sponsored by The Rapides Foundation. These include data collected through a (phone and internet-based) random sample population survey, an internet-based survey of key informants, and a review of existing public health data.

Highlighted are differences found when comparing to national data, as well as changes that have occurred since a similar survey was first implemented in Avoyelles Parish in 2002.

### Health Status

#### Overall Health Status

23.7% of adults characterize their overall health as “fair” or “poor” — this is significantly higher than reported nationally (12.6%) and is similar to that first recorded in Avoyelles Parish in 2002 (21.9%).

#### Activity Limitations

30.6% of Avoyelles Parish adults are limited in some way in some activities because of a health-related issue. This is significantly above what is found nationally (24.0%) and much higher than first found in 2002 (21.3%).

#### Mental Health

41.1% of Avoyelles Parish residents have experienced bouts of depression lasting two or more years during their lives, higher than found nationwide (30.3%). Similar to the 34.6% first reported in 2002. A total of 28.8% have been diagnosed with a depressive disorder by a healthcare professional (compared to 20.6% nationwide). Overall, 22.8% of the population are currently being treated for a mental health condition (compared to 16.8% nationally), and 9.4% report a time in the past year when they needed such services but were unable to get them.

### Death & Chronic Disease

#### Causes of Death

Cardiovascular disease (heart disease and stroke) and cancers are leading causes of death in Avoyelles Parish. Compared to US rates, age-adjusted death rates for most leading causes of death are higher in Avoyelles Parish than nationwide (including heart disease, cancer, COVID-19, lung disease, Alzheimer’s disease, stroke, and diabetes).

#### Heart Disease & Stroke

10.0% of Avoyelles Parish adults report having heart disease, and 5.3% have ever suffered from a stroke.

#### Cancer

7.5% of adults have ever been diagnosed with cancer.

#### Diabetes

14.9% of Avoyelles Parish adults have been diagnosed with diabetes. This is similar to the 12.0% reported in 2002.



## Lung Disease

12.2% of Avoyelles Parish residents have been diagnosed with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (which includes chronic bronchitis and emphysema), a prevalence that is significantly above what is found nationally (6.4%).

## Overweight & Obesity

Based on reported heights and weights, a clear majority of Avoyelles Parish adults (74.8%) are overweight, including 43.1% who are obese. The prevalence of obesity in the parish is higher than found nationally (31.3%) and has increased significantly since 2002 (32.5%).

## Infant Health & Family Planning

### Birth Outcomes & Risks

Of all births in Avoyelles Parish, 11.8% are low-weight (under 2500g), which is a high proportion when compared to the 8.2% nationally.

### Teen Births

The teen birth rate in Avoyelles Parish is high, with 55.6 births to girls age 15-19 for every 1,000 girls in this age group (compared to 20.9 nationally).

## Injury & Violence

### Unintentional Injury

Death rates due to unintentional injuries are much higher than reported nationally (a rate of 68.9, versus 51.6 nationally).

### Violence

Rates of violent crime are considerably worse in Avoyelles Parish than they are nationwide (rate of 652.8 versus 416.0 nationally). 2.0% of Avoyelles Parish adults report experiencing violent crime in the area in the past five years, and 5.5% report experiencing domestic violence in the past 5 years.

## Modifiable Health Risks

### Nutrition

Only 16.1% of Avoyelles Parish adults get the recommended 5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables per day, a decrease since first measured with this survey (22.9%). It is important to recognize, however, that 20.6% of parish adults do not live within ½ mile of a grocery store or supermarket (compared to 22.2% nationally).

### Physical Activity

Currently, only 15.2% of Avoyelles Parish adults meet physical activity guidelines. Further, 29.2% of parish adults report not engaging in any type of physical activity outside of work in the month before the survey interview.

### Blood Pressure & Cholesterol

In comparison to the nation, Avoyelles Parish exhibits a significantly high proportion of adults reporting high blood pressure (47.9% versus 36.9% across the US). A total of 32.1% of Avoyelles Parish adults report having high blood cholesterol. Each of these is significantly above what was first reported in 2002.



## **Tobacco Use**

31.3% of Avoyelles Parish adults currently smoke cigarettes, much higher than found nationally (17.4%). Another 8.4% use smokeless tobacco, and 11.3% use electronic cigarettes or vaping devices.

## **Cardiovascular Risk**

A very high percentage of Avoyelles Parish adults (92.3%) present one or more risk factors or behaviors for heart disease and stroke (including smoking, not getting physical activity, being overweight, or having high blood pressure or cholesterol), which is much higher than the 84.6% found nationally.

## **Substance Abuse**

Regarding alcohol use, 24.5% of parish adults are considered to be “excessive drinkers,” having had a high number of drinks on a single occasion or a high average number of drinks per day during the past month (similar to the 27.2% found nationally). Another 2.7% of Avoyelles Parish adults report illicit drug use in the past month (use of illegal drugs or improper use of prescription drugs). A total of 15.8% have used prescription opiates (either legally or illegally) in the past year, similar to past findings.

## **Prevention**

### **Routine Medical Care**

Most parish adults (75.0%) have been to a doctor or clinic for a routine checkup in the past year, similar to that reported in 2002 (72.0%).

### **Cancer Screenings**

Cancer screening levels in Avoyelles Parish are on par with national findings, including for: *female breast cancer* (74.6% of women age 50-74 have had a mammogram in the past 2 years, compared to 76.1% nationally); *cervical cancer* (81.1% of women age 21-65 have had a Pap smear in the past 3 years, compared to 73.8% nationally); and *colorectal cancer* (72.9% of all adults age 50-75 have had appropriate screening, compared to 77.4% nationally).

### **Dental Care**

A relatively low proportion of adults in Avoyelles Parish (51.4%) have received dental care in the past year (compared to 62.0% nationally). This is similar to that reported in Avoyelles Parish in 2002 (57.9%).

### **Vision Care**

A total of 55.1% of Avoyelles Parish adults have had a comprehensive eye exam in the past two years.

## **Access**

### **Health Insurance Coverage**

A total of 7.6% of Avoyelles Parish adults between the ages of 18 and 64 are without any type of insurance coverage for health care, either through private or public sources. This is similar to the national prevalence (8.7%) and a significant improvement from what was recorded in 2002 (33.5%). Still, cost remains a barrier, preventing residents from getting medical care (13.3% said they did not get needed medical care in the past year because of the cost).

### **Difficulties/Delays in Accessing Health Care**

A total of 43.5% of Avoyelles Parish adults have experienced some type of difficulty or delay in receiving health care in the past year, compared to 35.0% of adults nationwide. Appointment availability, difficulty finding physicians, and inconvenient office hours are the barriers impacting the greatest shares of adults in Avoyelles Parish.





### Cost of Prescriptions

A total of 13.5% of Avoyelles Parish adults have gone without a needed prescription in the past year because they could not afford it.

### Emergency Room Utilization

The proportion of Avoyelles Parish adults who have used a local emergency room more than once in the past year (13.1%) similar to that found nationwide (10.1%) and better than 2002 findings (18.2%).

## Perceptions of Key Informants

In an online survey of key informants in the area (e.g., public health professionals, physicians, other health providers, social services representatives, community leaders), the following health issues were most often characterized as “major problems” for Avoyelles Parish:



- Diabetes (100% said this is a “major problem” in Avoyelles Parish)
- Cancer (100% “major problem”)
- Heart Disease & Stroke (100% “major problem”)
- Substance Abuse (100% “major problem”)



## Significant Trends & Summary Tables

The following tables highlight positive and negative trends observed among the health indicators assessed in this project in comparison with baseline data.

- **Survey Data Indicators:** Trends for survey-derived indicators represent changes since 2002 (or earliest available survey data).
- **Other Data Indicators:** Trends for other indicators (e.g., public health data) represent point-to-point changes between the most current reporting period and the earliest presented in this report (typically representing the span of a decade).

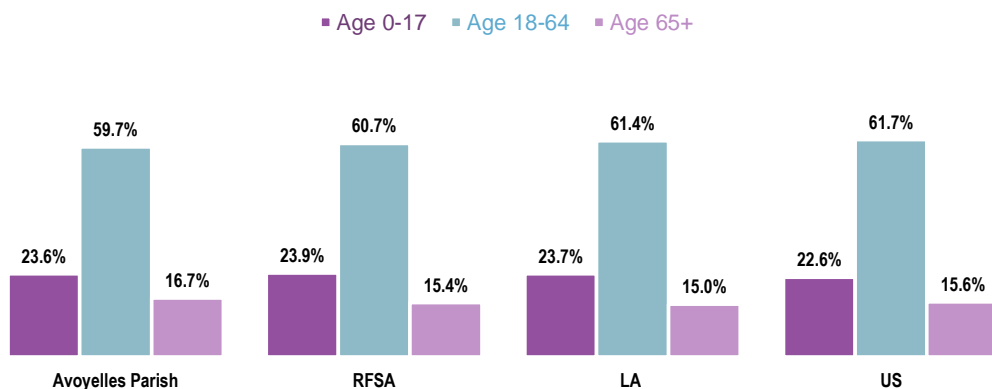

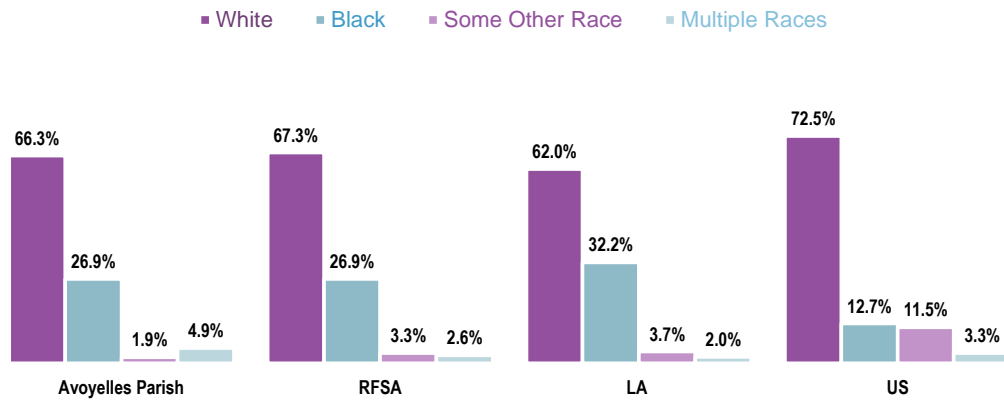

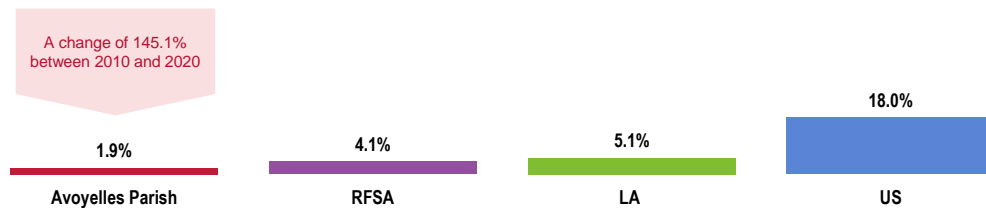
### Total Population by Race Alone (2015-2019)

# Social Determinants of Health

## ABOUT SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH

Social determinants of health (SDOH) are the conditions in the environments where people are born, live, learn, work, play, worship, and age that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-of-life outcomes and risks.

Social determinants of health (SDOH) have a major impact on people's health, well-being, and quality of life. Examples of SDOH include:

- Safe housing, transportation, and neighborhoods
- Racism, discrimination, and violence
- Education, job opportunities, and income
- Access to nutritious foods and physical activity opportunities
- Polluted air and water
- Language and literacy skills

SDOH also contribute to wide health disparities and inequities. For example, people who don't have access to grocery stores with healthy foods are less likely to have good nutrition. That raises their risk of health conditions like heart disease, diabetes, and obesity — and even lowers life expectancy relative to people who do have access to healthy foods.

Just promoting healthy choices won't eliminate these and other health disparities. Instead, public health organizations and their partners in sectors like education, transportation, and housing need to take action to improve the conditions in people's environments.

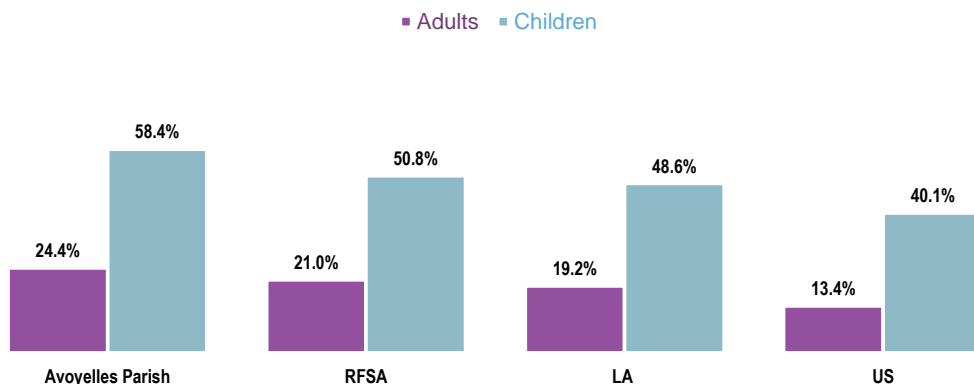

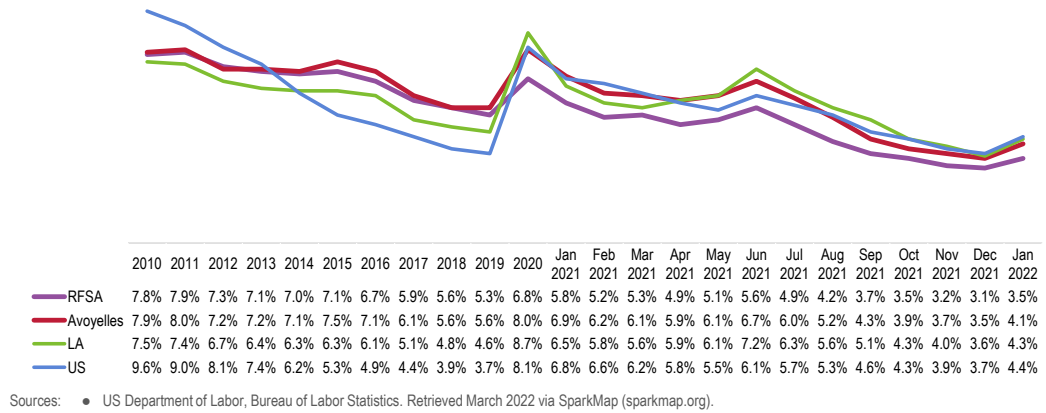

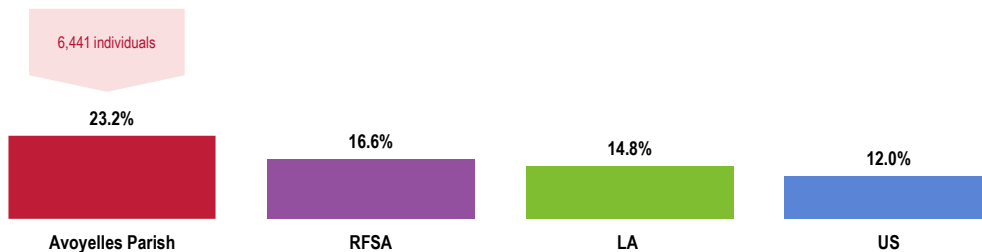
### Unemployment Rate

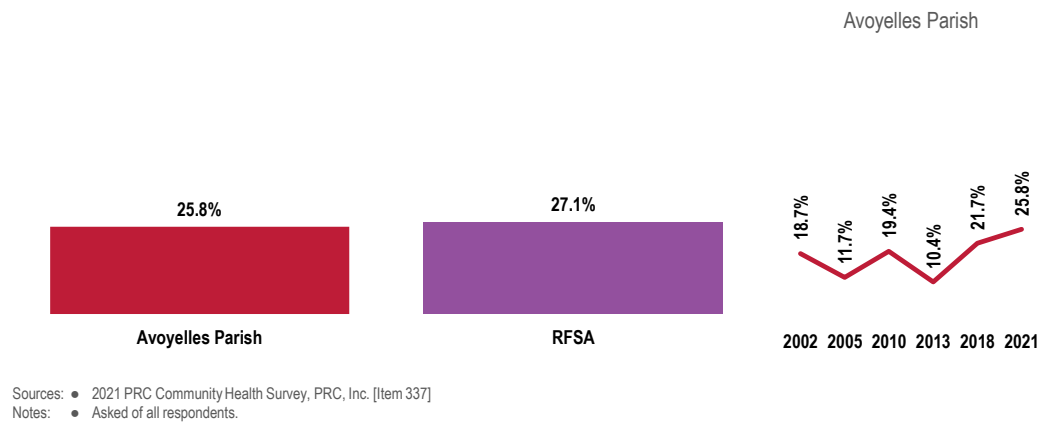

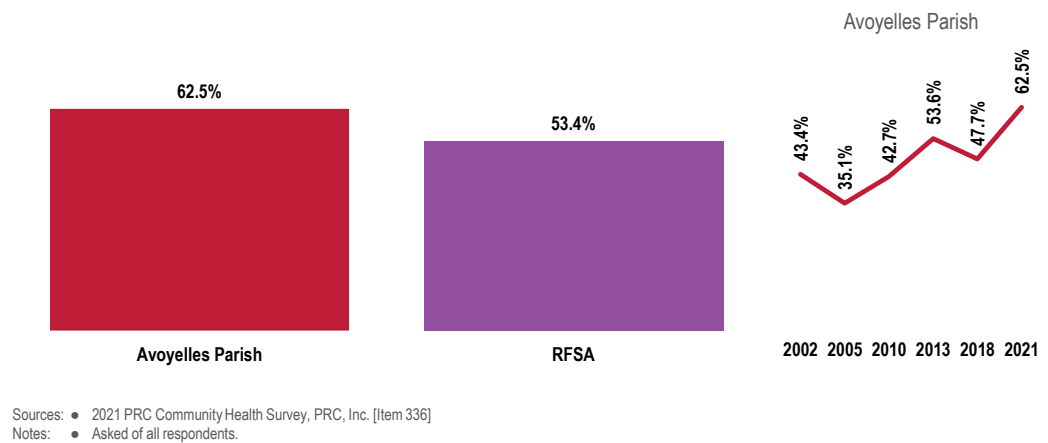
#### Perceive the Condition of Neighborhood Homes to be “Fair” or “Poor”

#### Perceive the Availability of Affordable Local Housing to be “Fair” or “Poor”

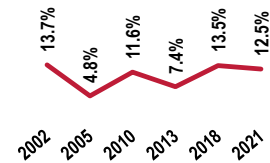

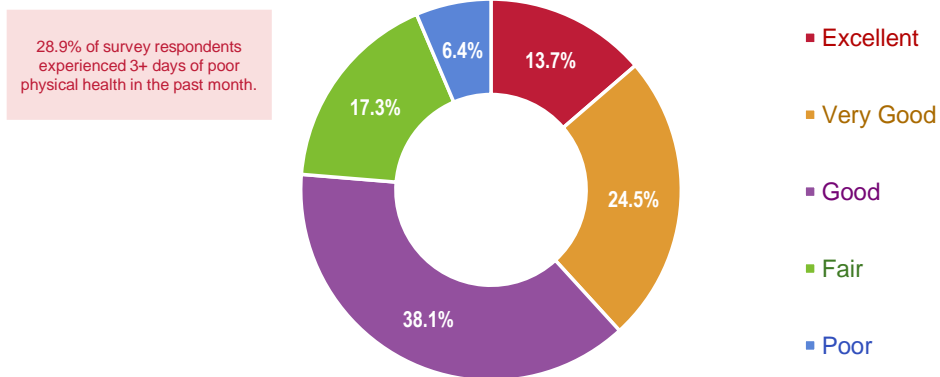

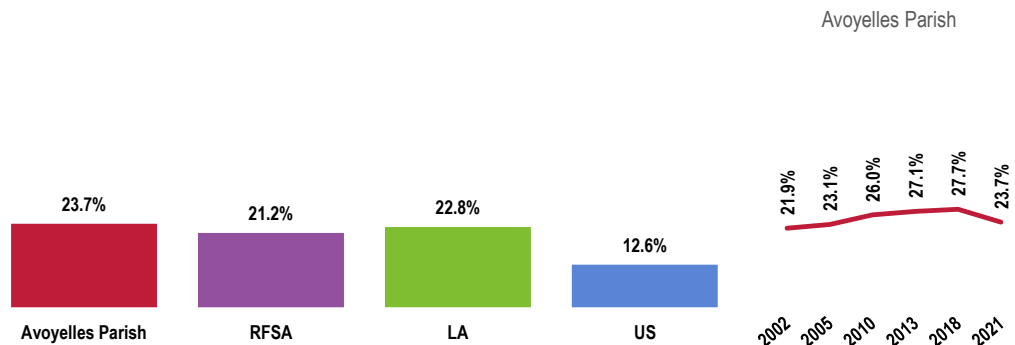
Self-Reported Health Status

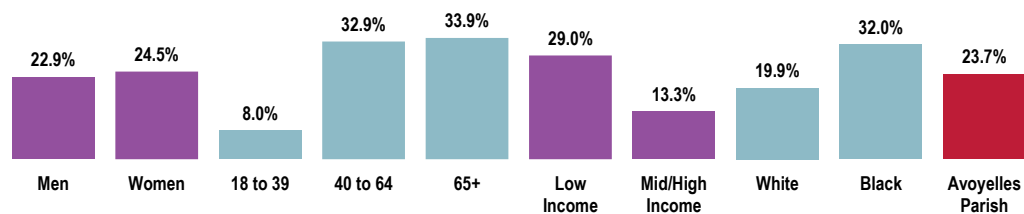
## Experience “Fair” or “Poor” Overall Health

## ABOUT MENTAL HEALTH & MENTAL DISORDERS

About half of all people in the United States will be diagnosed with a mental disorder at some point in their lifetime. ...Mental disorders affect people of all age and racial/ethnic groups, but some populations are disproportionately affected. And estimates suggest that only half of all people with mental disorders get the treatment they need.

In addition, mental health and physical health are closely connected. Mental disorders like depression and anxiety can affect people's ability to take part in healthy behaviors. Similarly, physical health problems can make it harder for people to get treatment for mental disorders. Increasing screening for mental disorders can help people get the treatment they need.

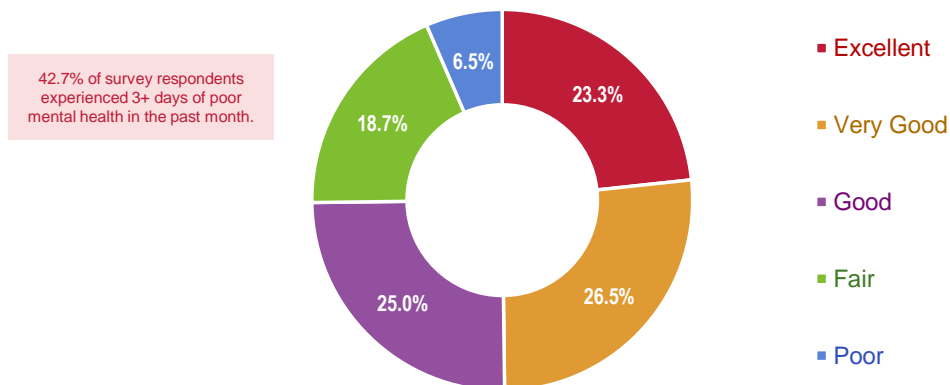

**“Thinking about your mental health, which includes stress, depression, and problems with emotions, for how many days during the past 30 days was your mental health not good?”**

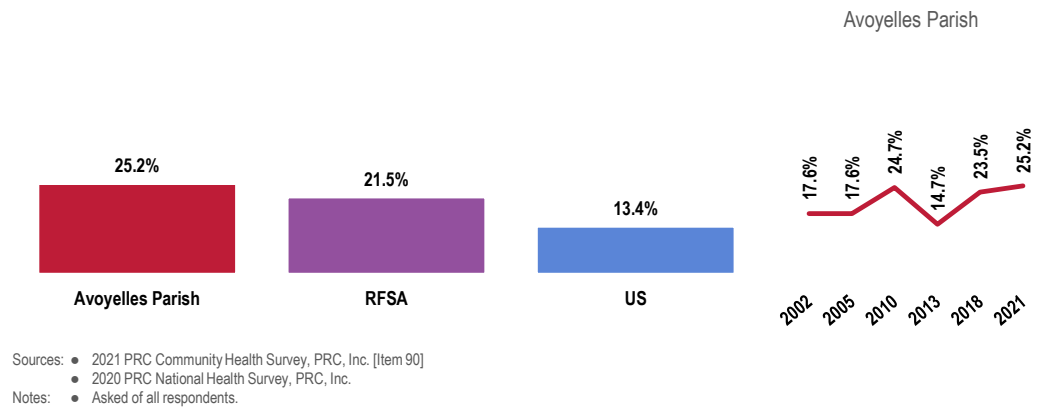
Self-Reported Mental Health Status

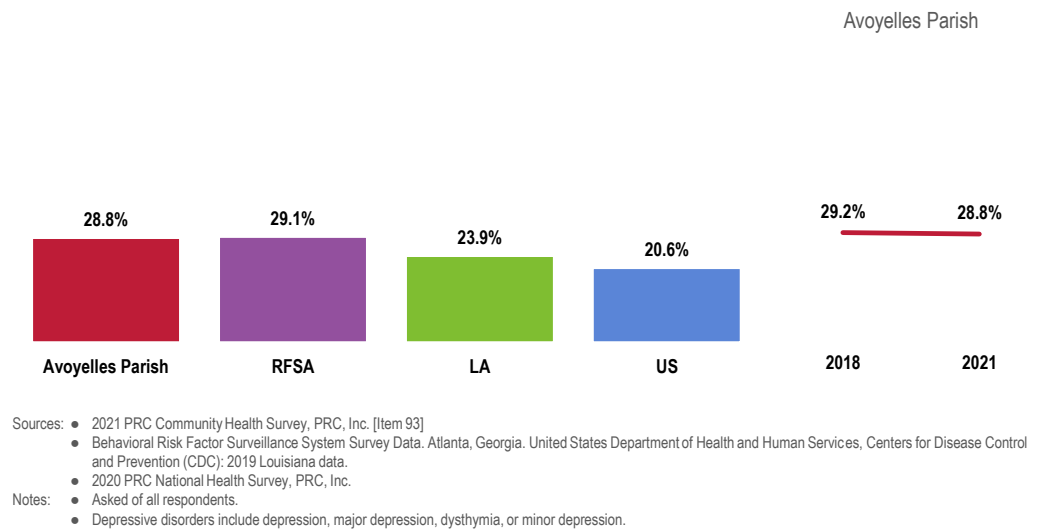

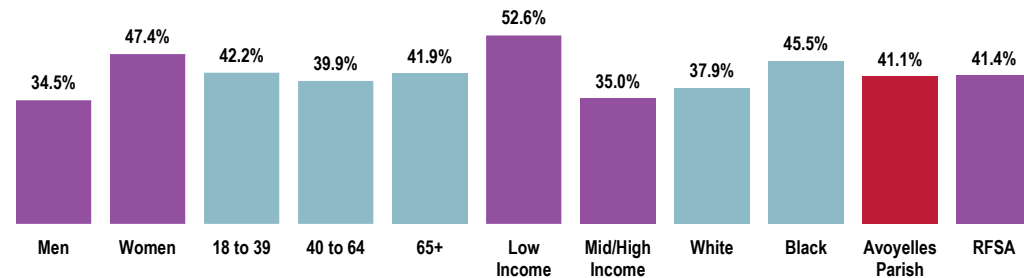

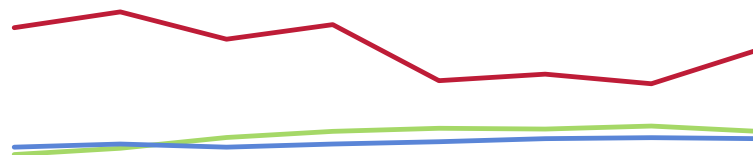

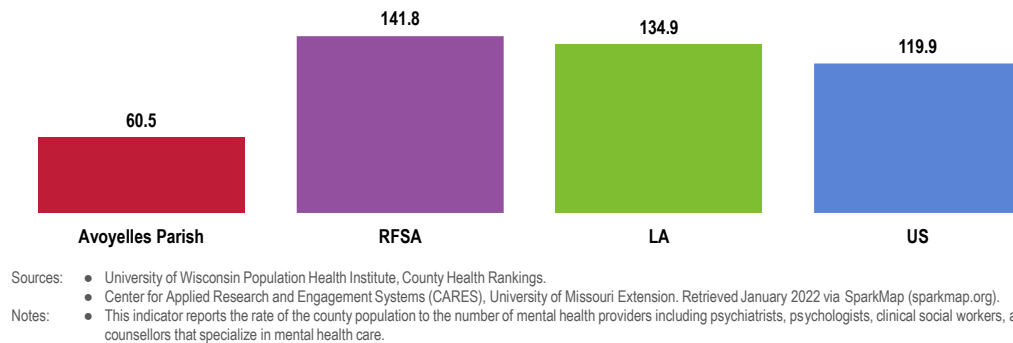


## Mental Health Treatment

(Number of Mental Health Providers per 100,000 Population, 2021)

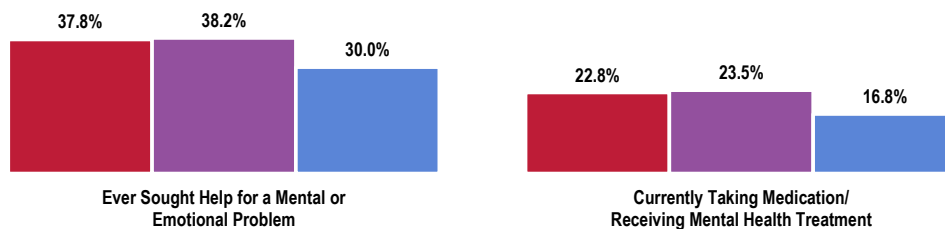

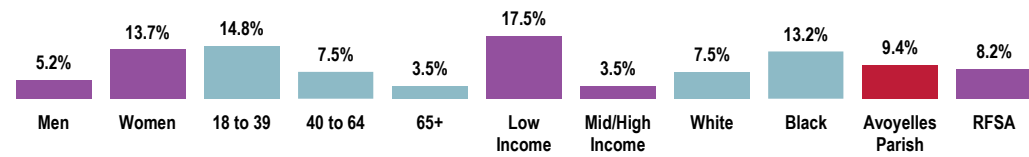

Among those rating this issue as a “major problem,” reasons related to the following:

### Contributing Factors

Limited number of mental health providers for middle class. ERs have limited beds to psych facilities for transfers. Lack of knowledge by health providers on mental health issues for referrals. And lack of follow up. Legislation protects the rights of adults who are mentally ill, even when they are unstable. Families can eat for assistance but uses someone is an immediate threat to themselves or others, nothing can be done. Families hands are tied. Mentally ill patients who are noncompliant with meds rarely make their healthcare or counseling visits. Those incarcerated are given limited access to mental health care unless they are sent elsewhere to a psych hospital. Beds are limited. Many just admit for the payment and ship back when their payment has been exhausted. – Social Services Provider (Avoyelles Parish)

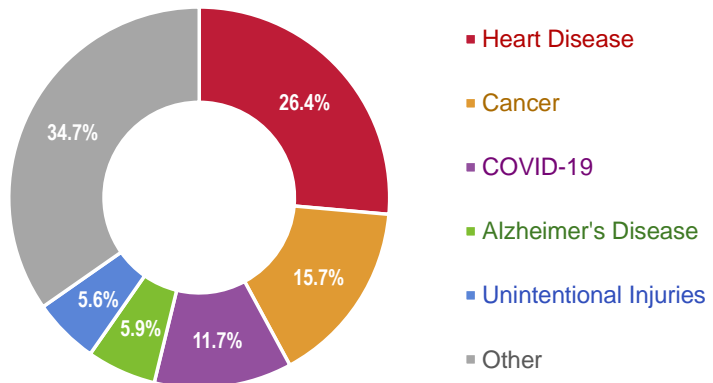

## Age-Adjusted Death Rates for Selected Causes

### AGE-ADJUSTED DEATH RATES

In order to compare mortality in the region with other localities (in this case, Louisiana and the United States), it is necessary to look at rates of death — these are figures which represent the number of deaths in relation to the population size (such as deaths per 100,000 population, as is used here).

Furthermore, in order to compare localities without undue bias toward younger or older populations, the common convention is to adjust the data to some common baseline age distribution. Use of these “age-adjusted” rates provides the most valuable means of gauging mortality against benchmark data, as well as Healthy People 2030 objectives.



The following chart outlines annual average age-adjusted death rates per 100,000 population for selected causes of death in Avoyelles Parish.

## ABOUT HEART DISEASE & STROKE

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States, and stroke is the fifth leading cause. ...Heart disease and stroke can result in poor quality of life, disability, and death. Though both diseases are common, they can often be prevented by controlling risk factors like high blood pressure and high cholesterol through treatment.

In addition, making sure people who experience a cardiovascular emergency — like stroke, heart attack, or cardiac arrest — get timely recommended treatment can reduce their risk for long-term disability and death. Teaching people to recognize symptoms is key to helping more people get the treatment they need.

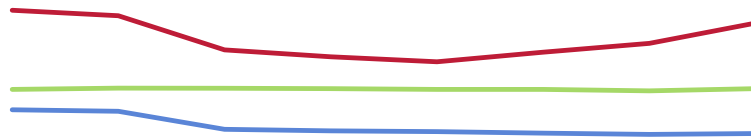

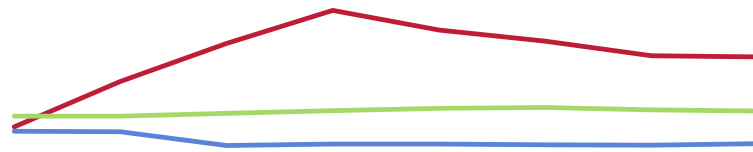

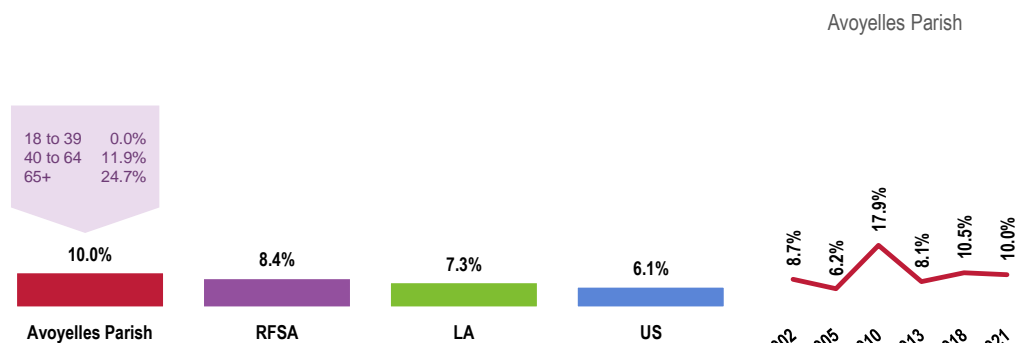

## Prevalence of Heart Disease



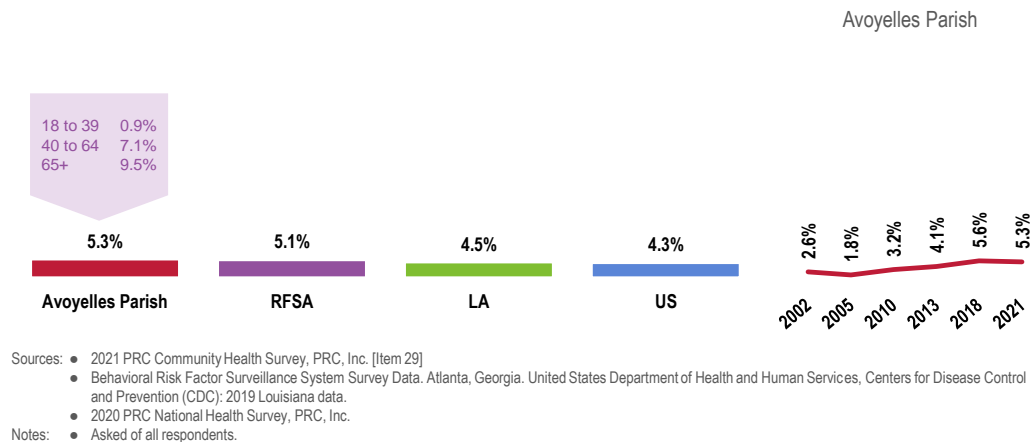

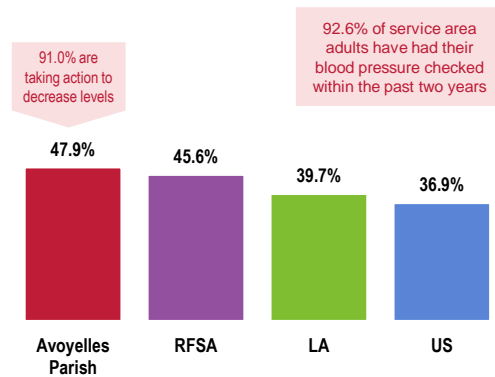

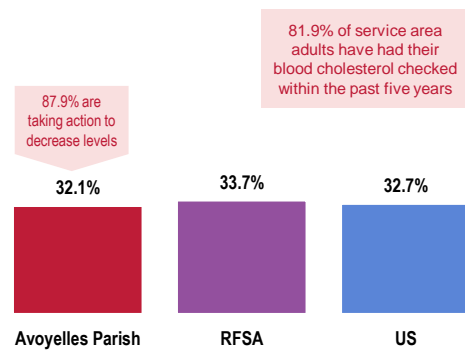

## Prevalence of High Blood Cholesterol

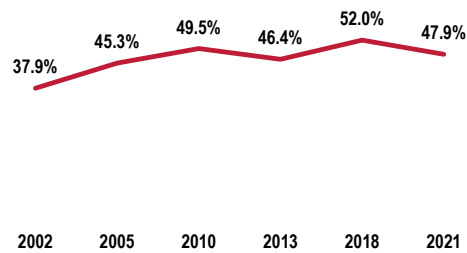

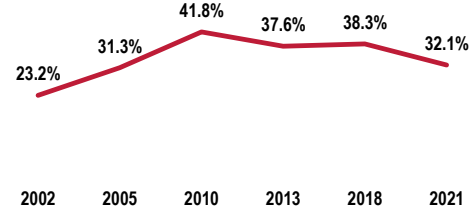

Total cardiovascular risk reflects the individual-level risk factors which put a person at increased risk for cardiovascular disease, including:

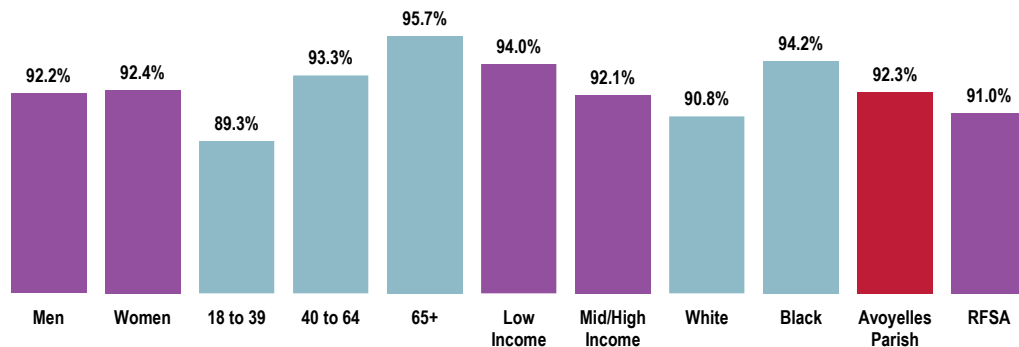
- High Blood Pressure
- High Blood Cholesterol
- Cigarette Smoking
- Physical Inactivity
- Overweight/Obesity

Modifying these behaviors and adhering to treatment for high blood pressure and cholesterol are critical both for preventing and for controlling cardiovascular disease.

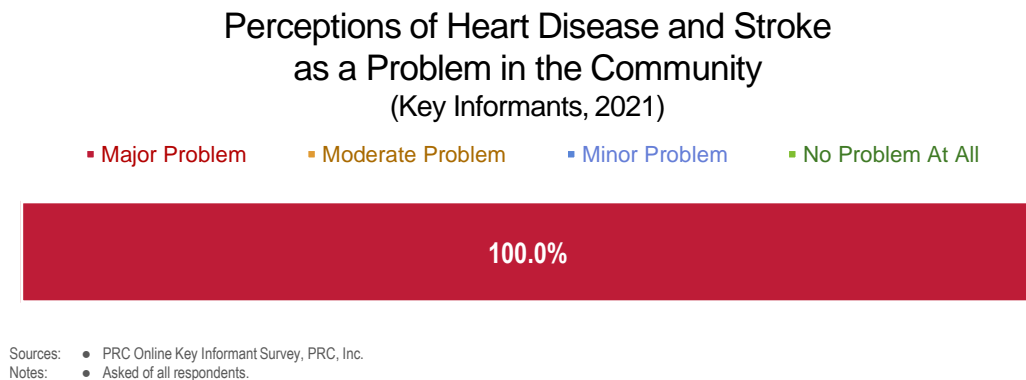

## Cancer

### ABOUT CANCER

Cancer is the second leading cause of death in the United States. ...The cancer death rate has declined in recent decades, but over 600,000 people still die from cancer each year in the United States. Death rates are higher for some cancers and in some racial/ethnic minority groups. These disparities are often linked to social determinants of health, including education, economic status, and access to health care.

Interventions to promote evidence-based cancer screenings — such as screenings for lung, breast, cervical, and colorectal cancer — can help reduce cancer deaths. Other effective prevention strategies include programs that increase HPV vaccine use, prevent tobacco use and promote quitting, and promote healthy eating and physical activity. In addition, effective targeted therapies and personalized treatment are key to helping people with cancer live longer.

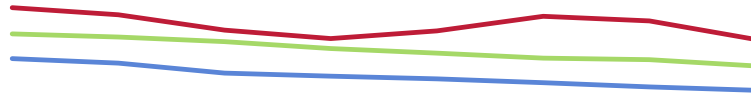

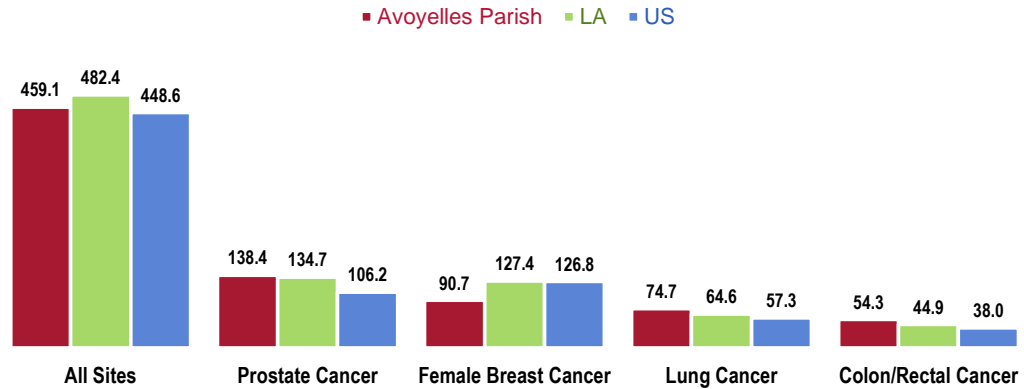

## Cancer Incidence

“Incidence rate” or “case rate” is the number of newly diagnosed cases in a given population in a given year, regardless of outcome. These rates are also age-adjusted. It is usually expressed as cases per 100,000 population per year.

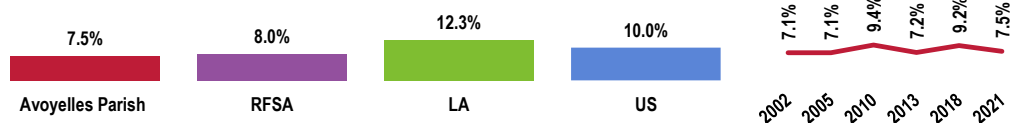

## ABOUT CANCER RISK

Reducing the nation's cancer burden requires reducing the prevalence of behavioral and environmental factors that increase cancer risk.

- All cancers caused by cigarette smoking could be prevented. At least one-third of cancer deaths that occur in the United States are due to cigarette smoking.
  - According to the American Cancer Society, about one-third of cancer deaths that occur in the United States each year are due to nutrition and physical activity factors, including obesity.

## Cancer Screenings

Screening levels in the community were measured in the PRC Community Health Survey relative to three cancer sites: female breast cancer (mammography); cervical cancer (Pap smear testing); and colorectal cancer (sigmoidoscopy and fecal occult blood testing).

The American Cancer Society recommends that both men and women get a cancer-related checkup during a regular doctor's checkup. It should include examination for cancers of the thyroid, testicles, ovaries, lymph nodes, oral cavity, and skin, as well as health counseling about tobacco, sun exposure, diet and nutrition, risk factors, sexual practices, and environmental and occupational exposures.

### FEMALE BREAST CANCER

The US Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends biennial screening mammography for women aged 50 to 74 years.

### CERVICAL CANCER

The US Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends screening for cervical cancer every 3 years with cervical cytology alone in women aged 21 to 29 years. For women aged 30 to 65 years, the USPSTF recommends screening every 3 years with cervical cytology alone, every 5 years with high-risk human papillomavirus (hrHPV) testing alone, or every 5 years with hrHPV testing in combination with cytology (cotesting). The USPSTF recommends against screening for cervical cancer in women who have had a hysterectomy with removal of the cervix and do not have a history of a high-grade precancerous lesion (i.e., cervical intraepithelial neoplasia [CIN] grade 2 or 3) or cervical cancer.

### COLORECTAL CANCER

The US Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends screening for colorectal cancer starting at age 50 years and continuing until age 75 years.

**BREAST CANCER SCREENING** ► “A mammogram is an x-ray of each breast to look for cancer. How long has it been since you had your last mammogram?”

Breast cancer screening is calculated here among women age 50 to 74 who indicate mammography within the past 2 years.

**CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING** ► “A Pap test is a test for cancer of the cervix. How long has it been since you had your last Pap test?”

[If Pap test in the past five years] “HPV, or the human papillomavirus, is a common infection that can cause several types of cancer. When you received your last Pap test, were you screened for HPV?”

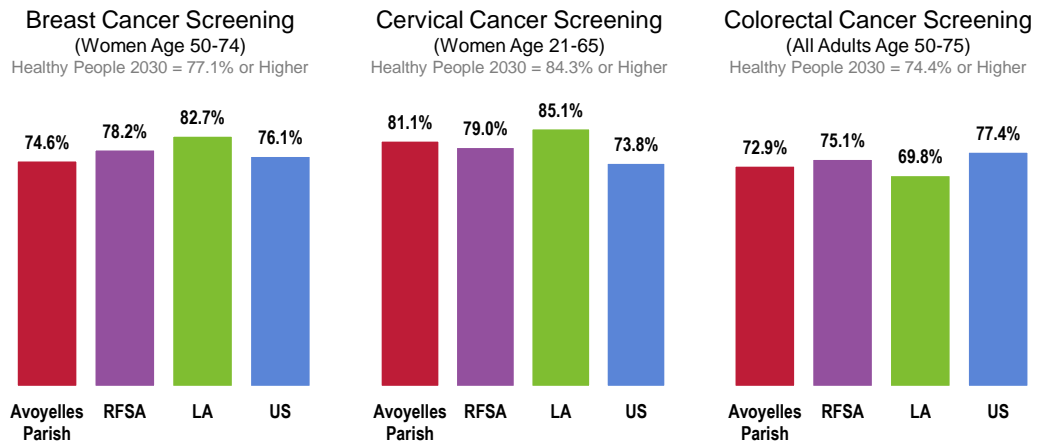
“Have you ever had a hysterectomy?”

“Appropriate cervical cancer screening” includes Pap smear testing (cervical cytology) every three years in women age 21 to 29 and Pap smear testing and/or HPV testing every 5 years in women age 30 to 65. Women 21 to 65 with hysterectomy are excluded.

**COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING** ► “Sigmoidoscopy and colonoscopy are exams in which a tube is inserted in the rectum to view the colon for signs of cancer or other health problems. How long has it been since your last sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy?”

“A blood stool test is a test that may use a special kit at home to determine whether the stool contains blood. How long has it been since you had your last blood stool test?”

“Appropriate colorectal cancer screening” is calculated here among men and women age 50 to 75 years who have had a fecal occult blood test within the past year and/or a lower endoscopy (sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy) within the past 10 years.

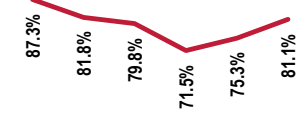

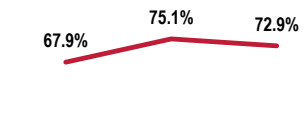

# Respiratory Disease

## ABOUT RESPIRATORY DISEASE

Respiratory diseases affect millions of people in the United States. ...More than 25 million people in the United States have asthma. Strategies to reduce environmental triggers and make sure people get the right medications can help prevent hospital visits for asthma. In addition, more than 16 million people in the United States have COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease), which is a major cause of death. Strategies to prevent the disease — like reducing air pollution and helping people quit smoking — are key to reducing deaths from COPD.

Interventions tailored to at-risk groups can also help prevent and treat other respiratory diseases — for example, pneumonia in older adults and pneumoconiosis in coal miners. And increasing lung cancer screening rates can help reduce deaths from lung cancer through early detection and treatment.

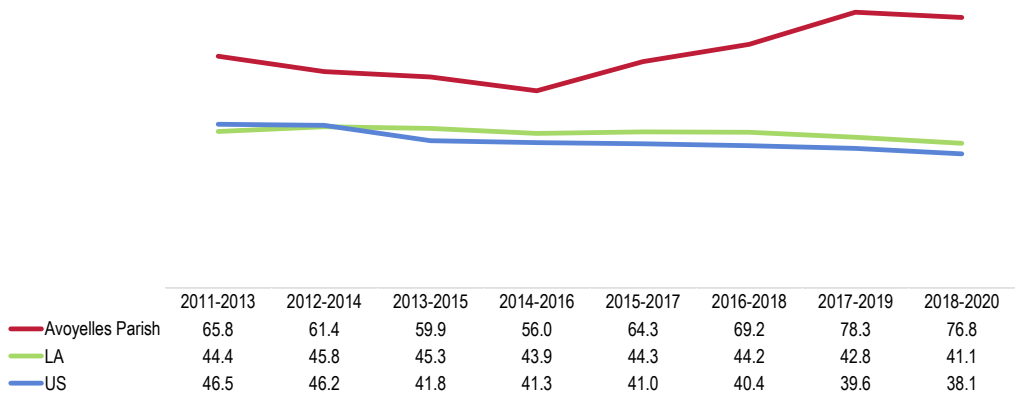

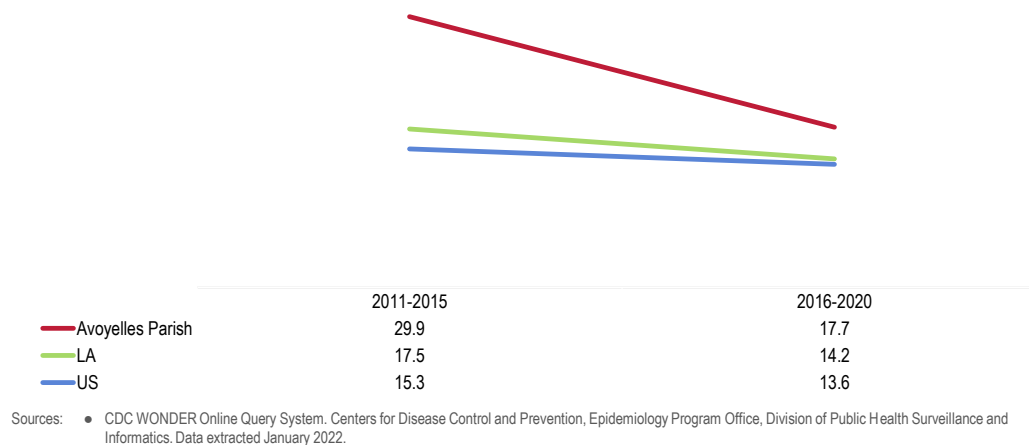
**CLRD: Age-Adjusted Mortality Trends**

## Pneumonia/Influenza: Age-Adjusted Mortality Trends (Annual Average Deaths per 100,000 Population)

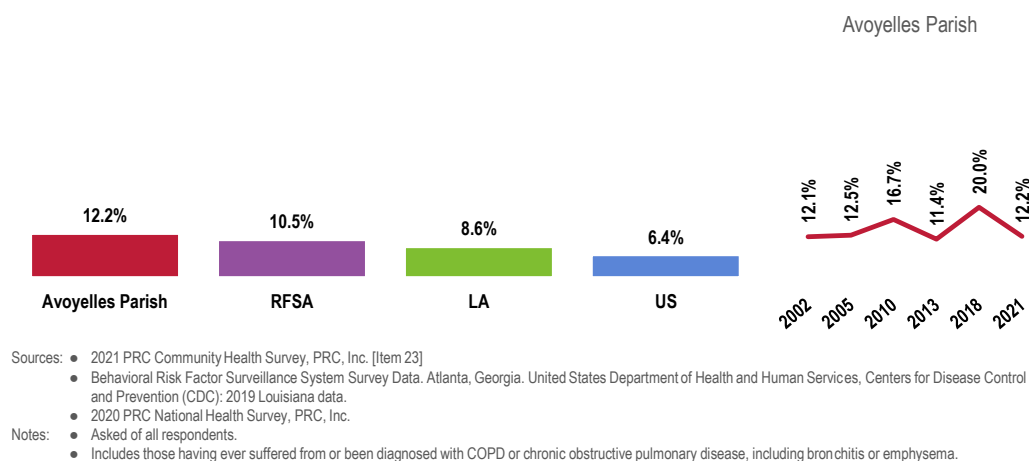

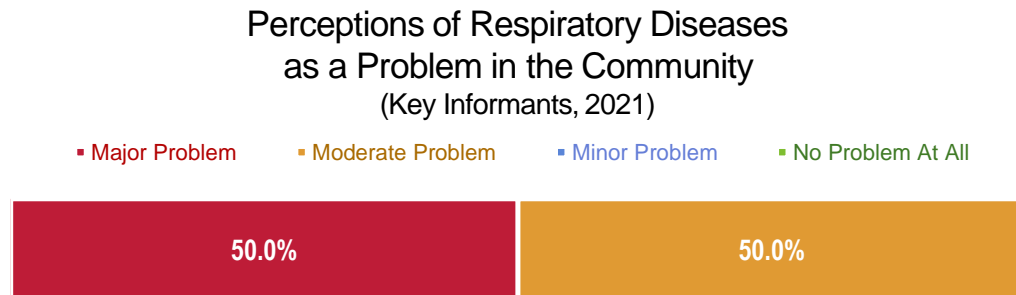

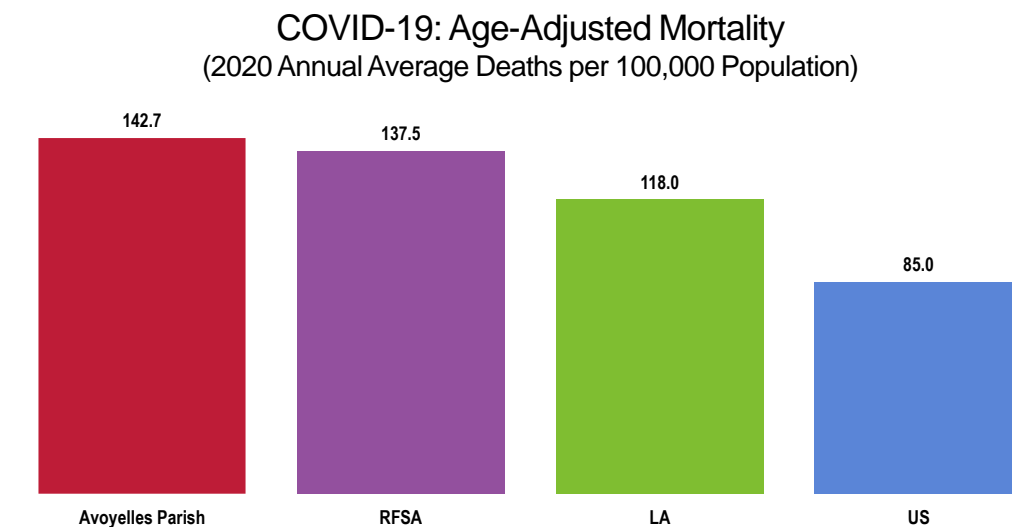

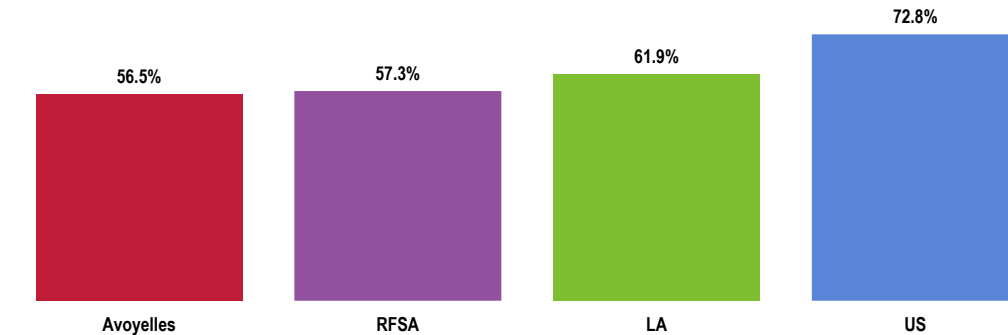

(Percentage of Adults Who Are Fully Vaccinated; by Parish)

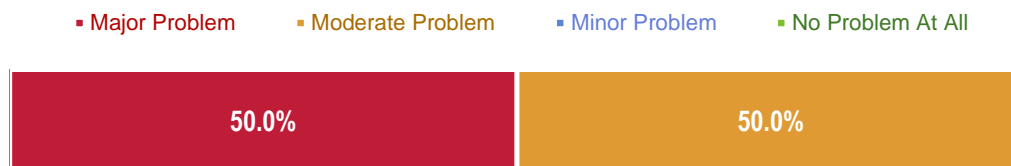

### Lack of Adherence to Public Health Mitigation Measures

Avoyelles has some of the highest numbers of transmission because businesses and public do not adhere to mask and social distance policies. There are no resources for health specialists in our area for post-COVID health problems in patients. Pulmonology, cardiology, neurology, etc. COVID testing is limited during after-hours. Urgent care is only open till 8pm. Health unit is only testing 8–2. Primary care offices close at 5. Those who work or have alternate schedules have no way to test after typical working hours except ERs. – Social Services Provider (Avoyelles Parish)



# Injury & Violence

## ABOUT INJURY & VIOLENCE

**INJURY** ► In the United States, unintentional injuries are the leading cause of death in children, adolescents, and adults younger than 45 years. ...Many unintentional injuries are caused by motor vehicle crashes and falls, and many intentional injuries involve gun violence and physical assaults. Interventions to prevent different types of injuries are key to keeping people safe in their homes, workplaces, and communities.

Drug overdoses are now the leading cause of injury deaths in the United States, and most overdoses involve opioids. Interventions to change health care providers' prescribing behaviors, distribute naloxone to reverse overdoses, and provide medications for addiction treatment for people with opioid use disorder can help reduce overdose deaths involving opioids.

**VIOLENCE** ► Almost 20,000 people die from homicide every year in the United States, and many more people are injured by violence. ...Many people in the United States experience physical assaults, sexual violence, and gun-related injuries. Adolescents are especially at risk for experiencing violence. Interventions to reduce violence are needed to keep people safe in their homes, schools, workplaces, and communities.

Children who experience violence are at risk for long-term physical, behavioral, and mental health problems. Strategies to protect children from violence can help improve their health and well-being later in life.

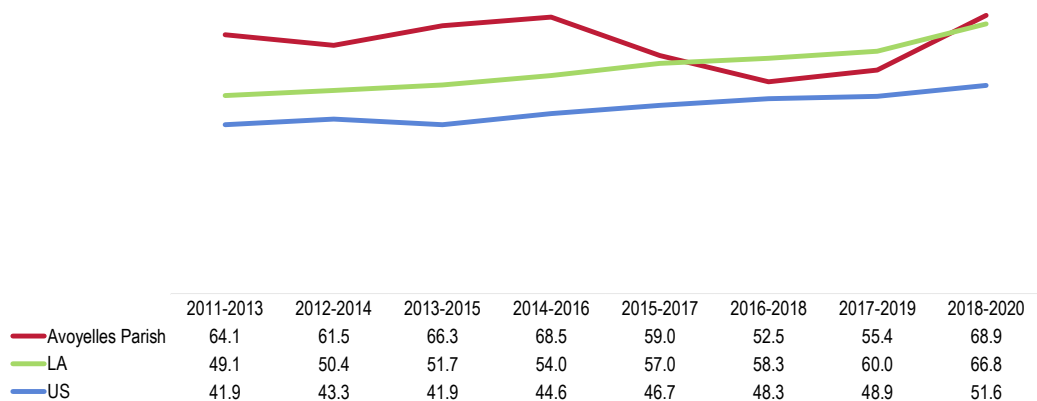

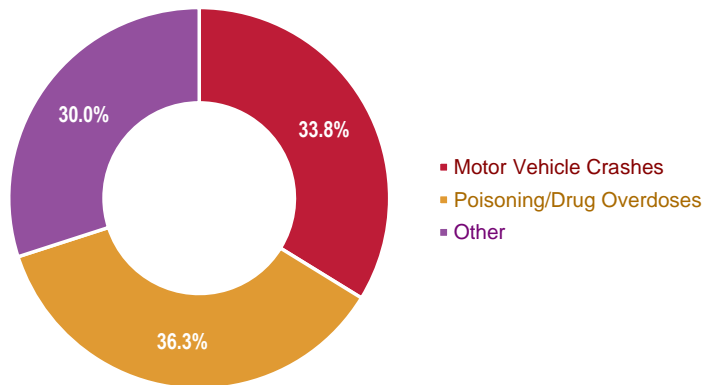

### Leading Causes of Unintentional Injury Deaths (Avoyelles Parish, 2018-2020)

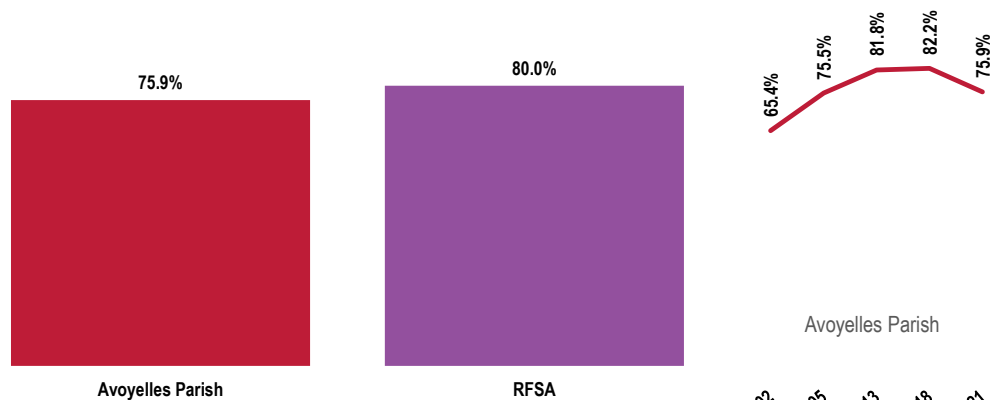

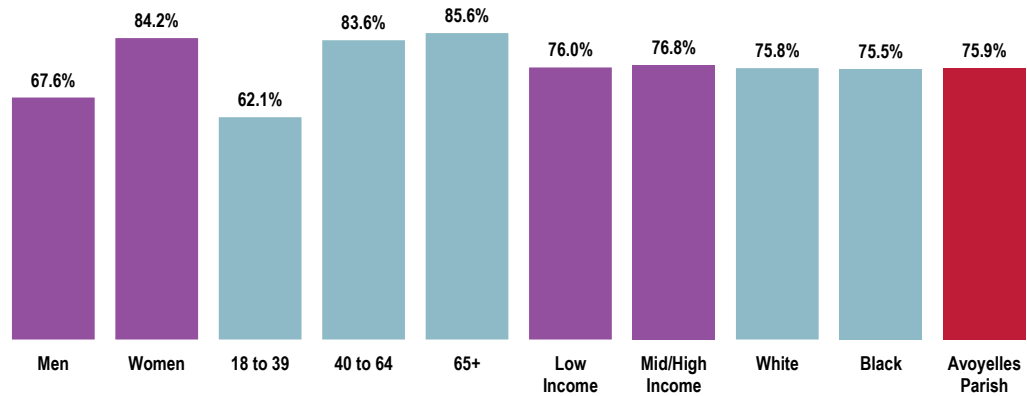
### “Always” Wear a Seat Belt or When Driving or Riding in a Vehicle

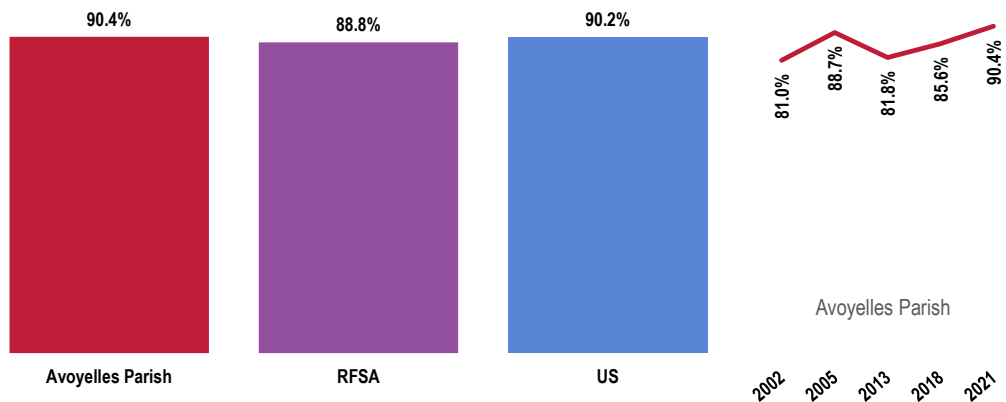

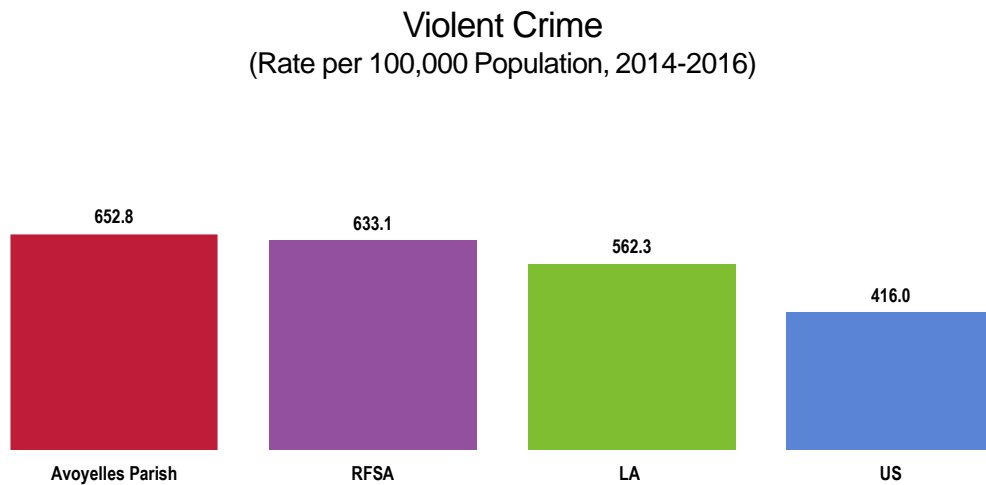

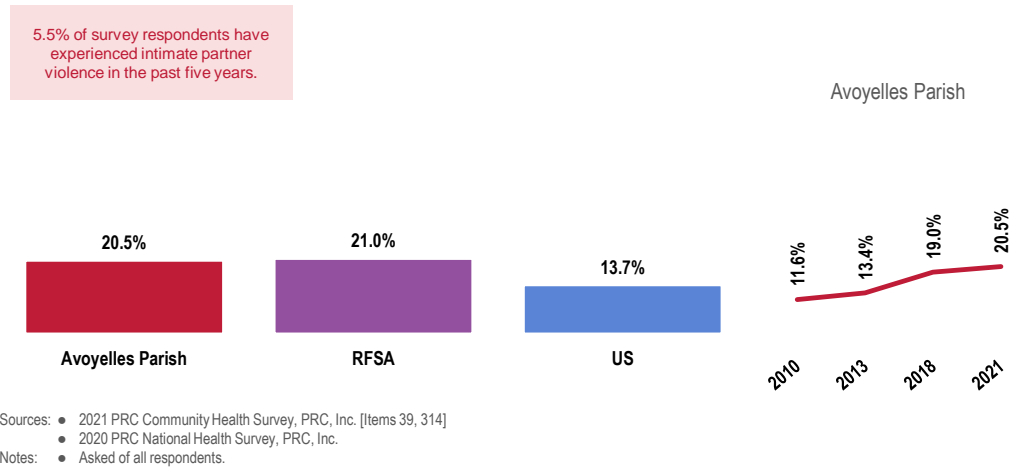

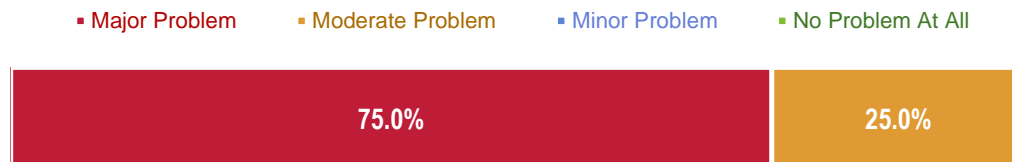
## Have Ever Been Hit, Slapped, Pushed, Kicked, or Hurt in Any Way by an Intimate Partner

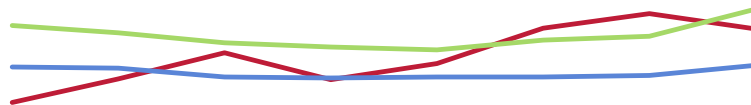

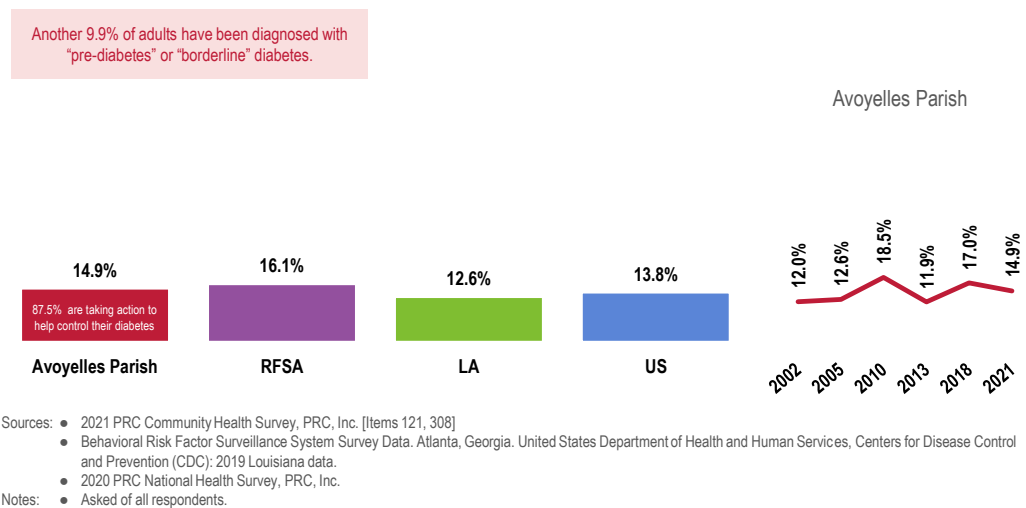

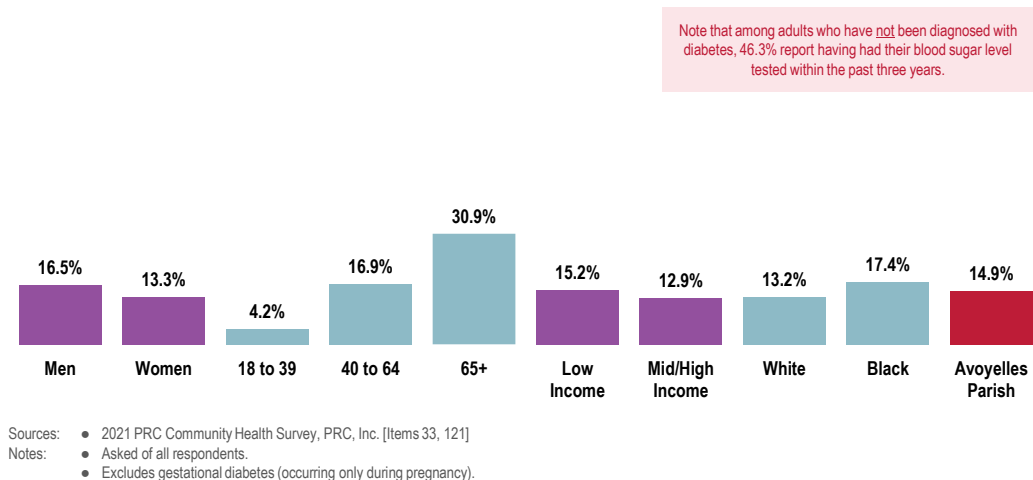

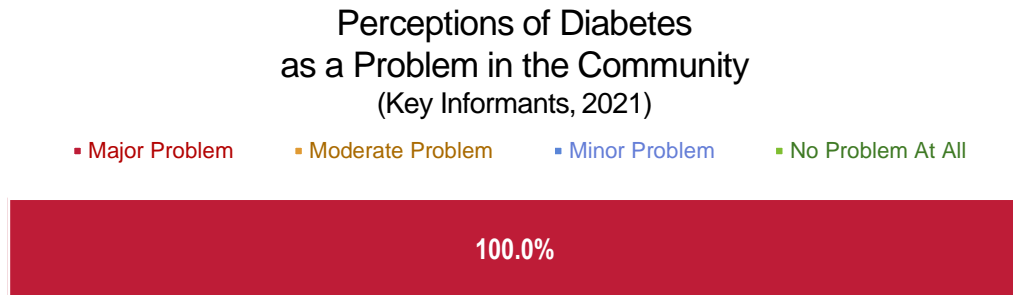

### ABOUT KIDNEY DISEASE

More than 1 in 7 adults in the United States may have chronic kidney disease (CKD), with higher rates in low-income and racial/ethnic minority groups. And most people with CKD don't know they have it. ...People with CKD are more likely to have heart disease and stroke — and to die early. Managing risk factors like diabetes and high blood pressure can help prevent or delay CKD. Strategies to make sure more people with CKD are diagnosed early can help people get the treatment they need.

Recommended tests can help identify people with CKD to make sure they get treatments and education that may help prevent or delay kidney failure and end-stage kidney disease (ESKD). In addition, strategies to make sure more people with ESKD get kidney transplants can increase survival rates and improve quality of life.

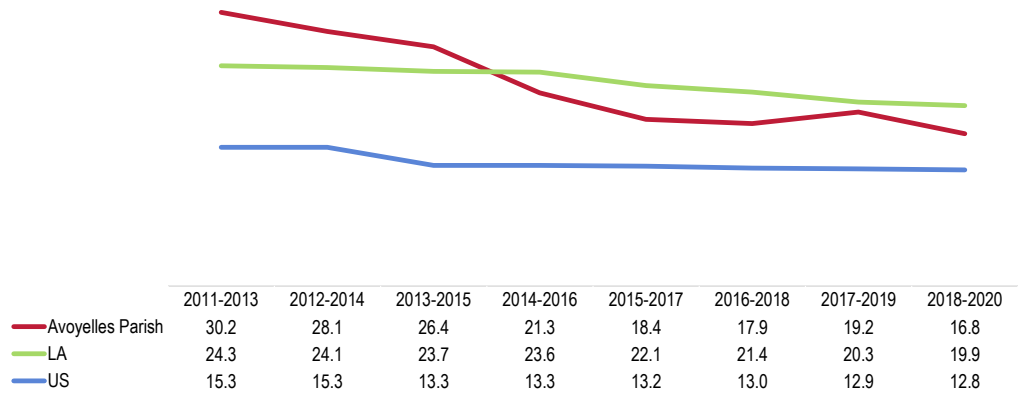

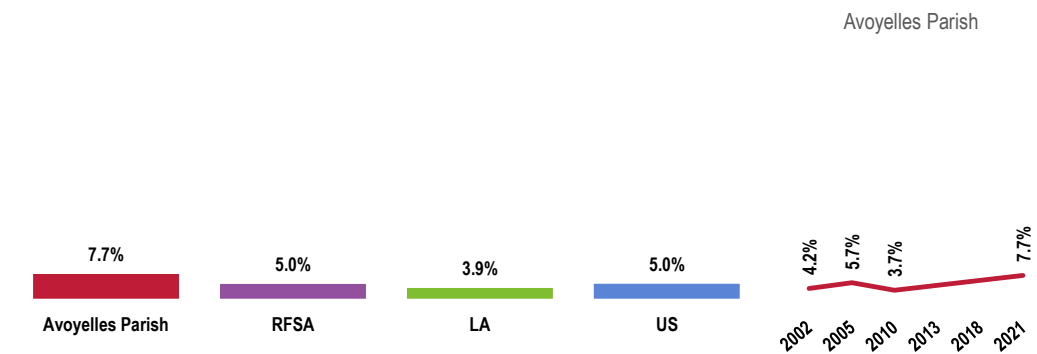

**Prevalence of Kidney Disease**



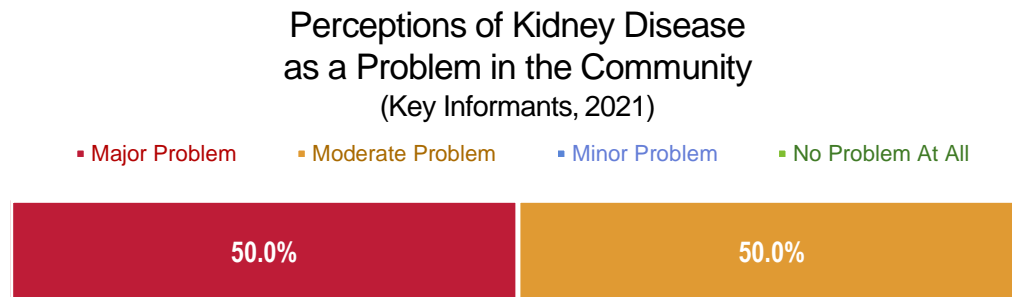

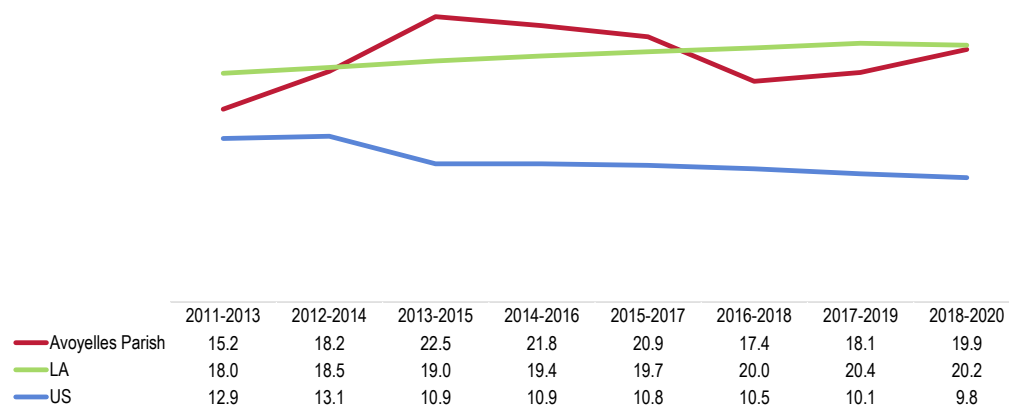

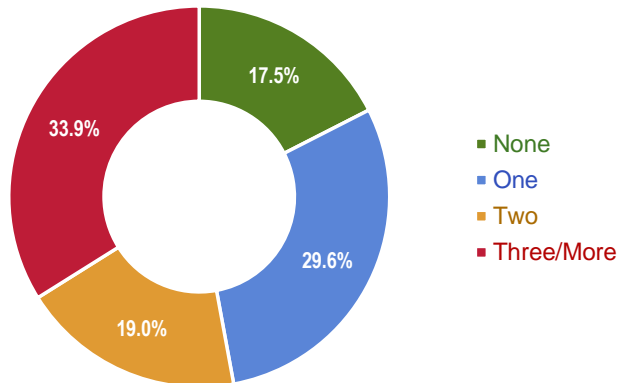

(Avoyelles Parish, 2021)

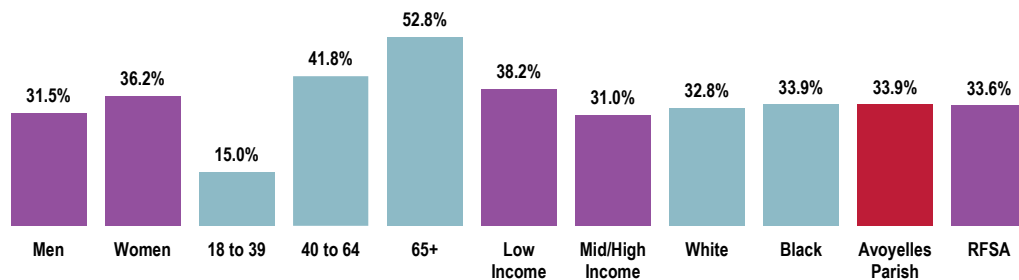

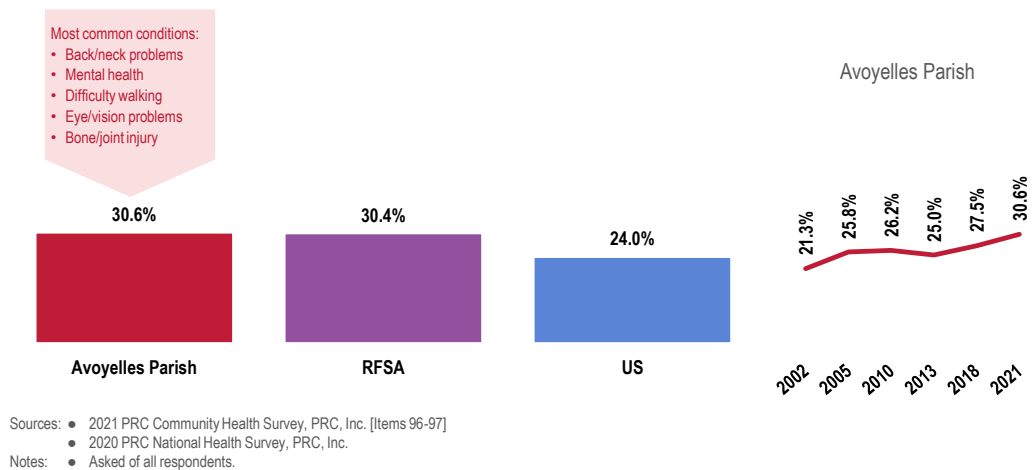

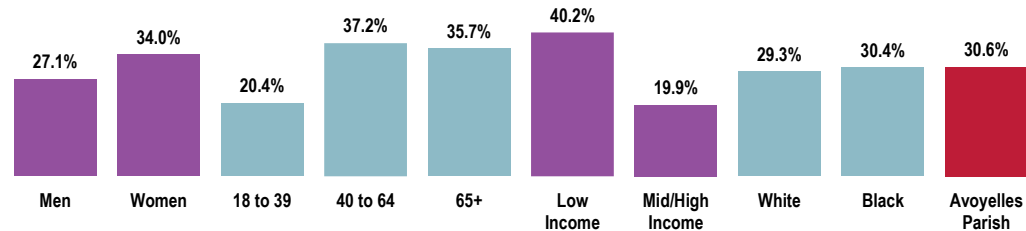

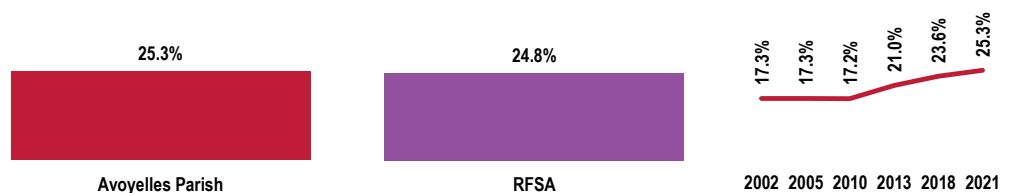

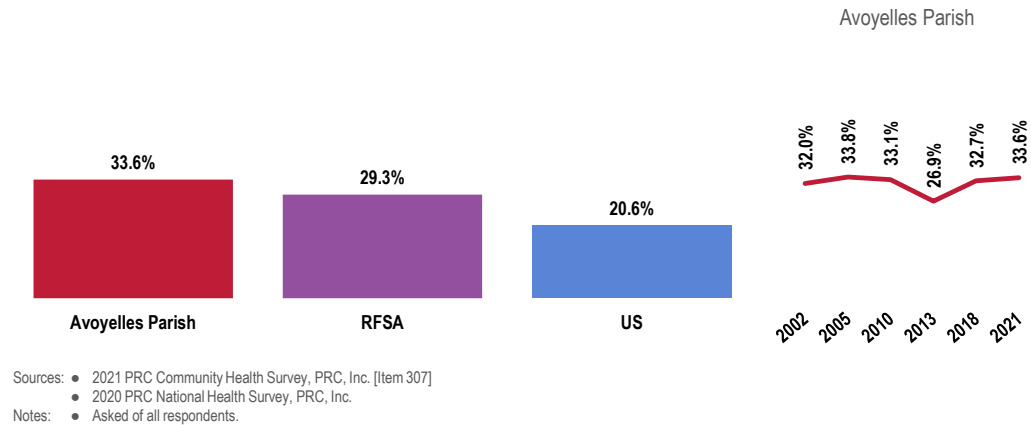

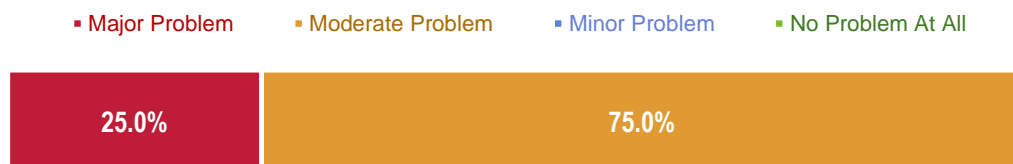

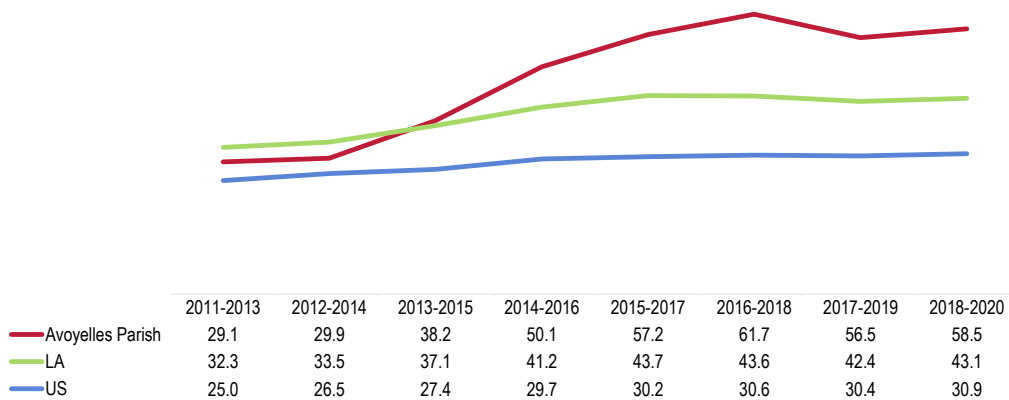

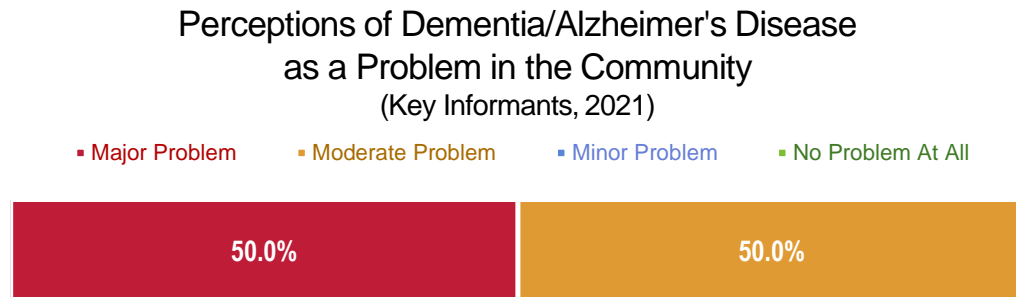

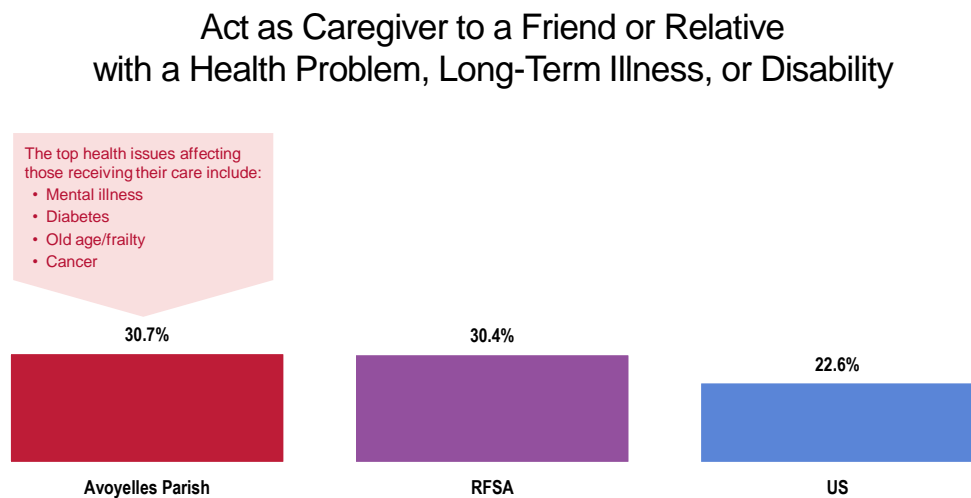

# BIRTHS

## ABOUT INFANT HEALTH

Keeping infants healthy starts with making sure women get high-quality care during pregnancy and improving women's health in general. After birth, strategies that focus on increasing breastfeeding rates and promoting vaccinations and developmental screenings are key to improving infants' health. Interventions that encourage safe sleep practices and correct use of car seats can also help keep infants safe.

The infant mortality rate in the United States is higher than in other high-income countries, and there are major disparities by race/ethnicity. Addressing social determinants of health is critical for reducing these disparities.

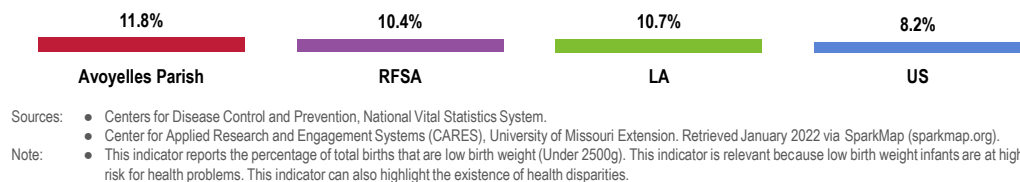
## Birth Outcomes & Risks

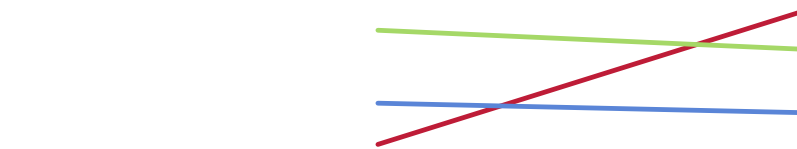
### Low-Weight Births (Percent of Live Births, 2013-2019)

## Family Planning

### ABOUT FAMILY PLANNING

Nearly half of pregnancies in the United States are unintended, and unintended pregnancy is linked to many negative outcomes for both women and infants. ...Unintended pregnancy is linked to outcomes like preterm birth and postpartum depression. Interventions to increase use of birth control are critical for preventing unintended pregnancies. Birth control and family planning services can also help increase the length of time between pregnancies, which can improve health for women and their infants.

Adolescents are at especially high risk for unintended pregnancy. Although teen pregnancy and birth rates have gone down in recent years, close to 200,000 babies are born to teen mothers every year in the United States. Linking adolescents to youth-friendly health care services can help prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections in this age group.

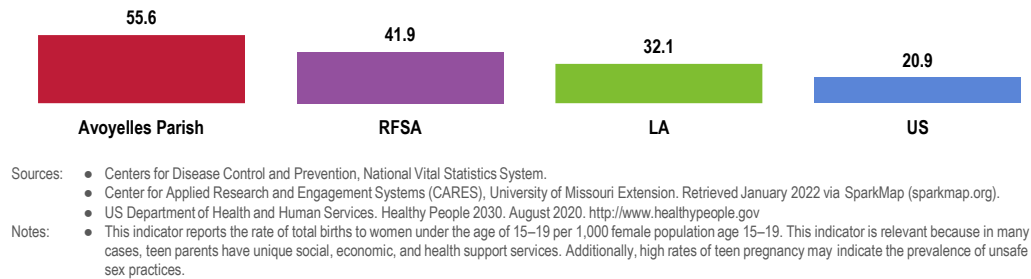

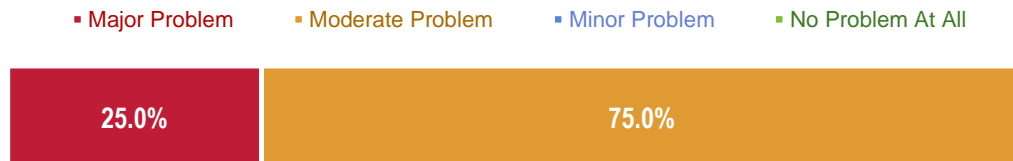

Many people in the United States don't eat a healthy diet. ...People who eat too many unhealthy foods — like foods high in saturated fat and added sugars — are at increased risk for obesity, heart disease, type 2 diabetes, and other health problems. Strategies and interventions to help people choose healthy foods can help reduce their risk of chronic diseases and improve their overall health.

Some people don't have the information they need to choose healthy foods. Other people don't have access to healthy foods or can't afford to buy enough food. Public health interventions that focus on helping everyone get healthy foods are key to reducing food insecurity and hunger and improving health.

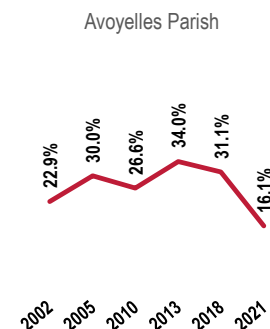
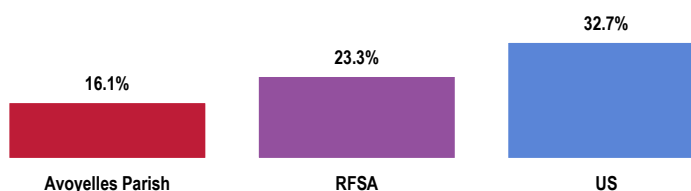

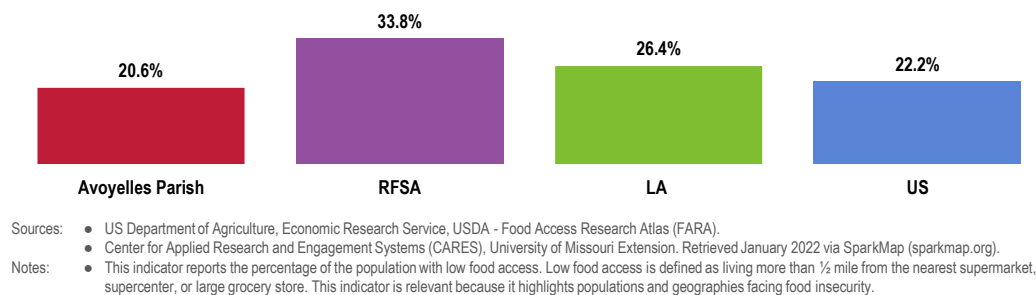

## Physical Activity

### ABOUT PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Physical activity can help prevent disease, disability, injury, and premature death. The Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans lays out how much physical activity children, adolescents, and adults need to get health benefits. Although most people don't get the recommended amount of physical activity, it can be especially hard for older adults and people with chronic diseases or disabilities.

Strategies that make it safer and easier to get active — like providing access to community facilities and programs — can help people get more physical activity. Strategies to promote physical activity at home, at school, and at childcare centers can also increase activity in children and adolescents.

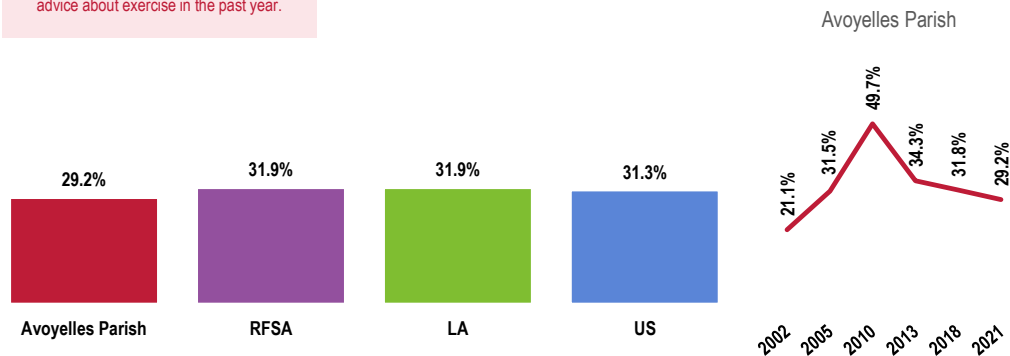

## Meeting Physical Activity Recommendations

### ADULTS: RECOMMENDED LEVELS OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY

Adults should do 2 hours and 30 minutes a week of moderate-intensity (such as walking), or 1 hour and 15 minutes (75 minutes) a week of vigorous-intensity **aerobic** physical activity (such as jogging), or an equivalent combination of moderate- and vigorous-intensity aerobic physical activity. The guidelines also recommend that adults do **muscle-strengthening** activities, such as push-ups, sit-ups, or activities using resistance bands or weights. These activities should involve all major muscle groups and be done on two or more days per week.

The report finds that nationwide nearly 50 percent of adults are getting the recommended amounts of aerobic activity and about 30 percent are engaging in the recommended muscle-strengthening activity.

To measure physical activity frequency, duration and intensity, respondents were asked:

**“During the past month, what type of physical activity or exercise did you spend the most time doing?”**

**“And during the past month, how many times per week or per month did you take part in this activity?”**

**“And when you took part in this activity, for how many minutes or hours did you usually keep at it?”**

Respondents could answer the above series for up to two types of physical activity. The specific activities identified (e.g., jogging, basketball, treadmill, etc.) determined the intensity values assigned to that respondent when calculating total aerobic physical activity hours/minutes.

Respondents were also asked about strengthening exercises:

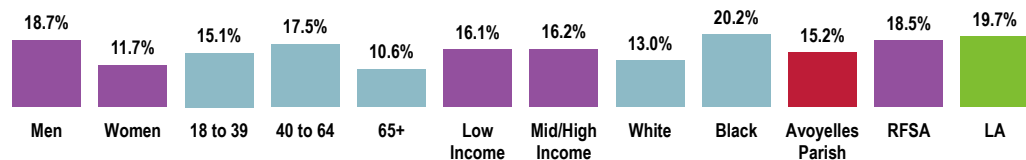
**“During the past month, how many times per week or per month did you do physical activities or exercises to strengthen your muscles? Do not count aerobic activities like walking, running, or bicycling. Please include activities using your own body weight, such as yoga, sit-ups, or push-ups, and those using weight machines, free weights, or elastic bands.”**

“Meeting physical activity recommendations” includes adequate levels of both aerobic and strengthening activity:

- Aerobic activity is at least 150 minutes per week of light to moderate activity, 75 minutes per week of vigorous physical activity, or an equivalent combination of both;
- Strengthening activity is at least 2 sessions per week of exercise designed to strengthen muscles.

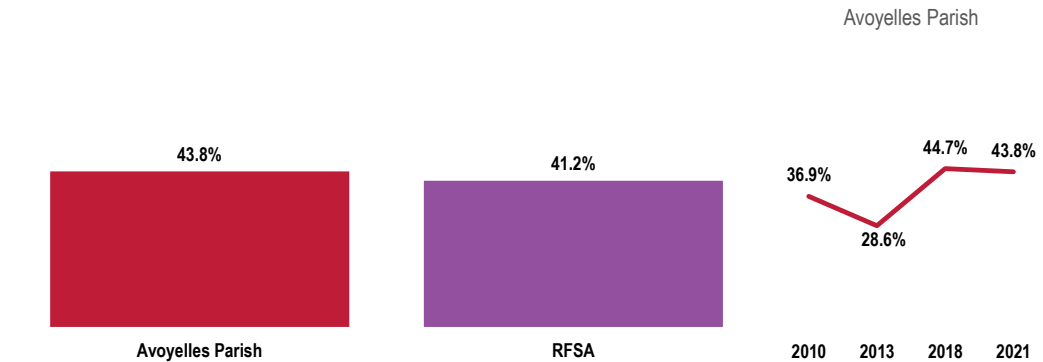

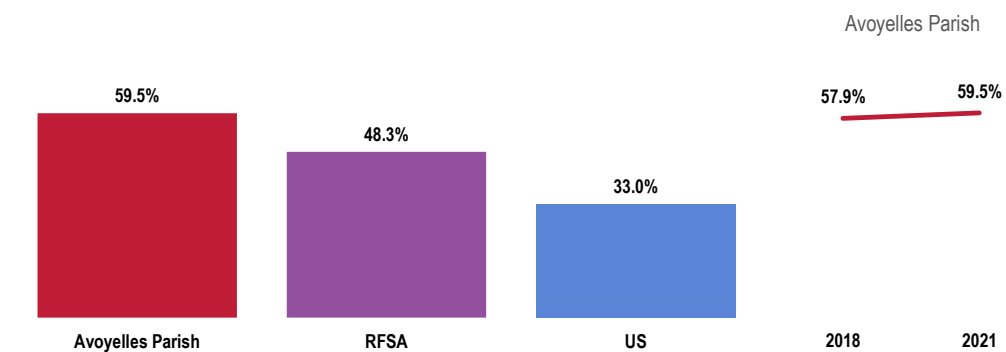

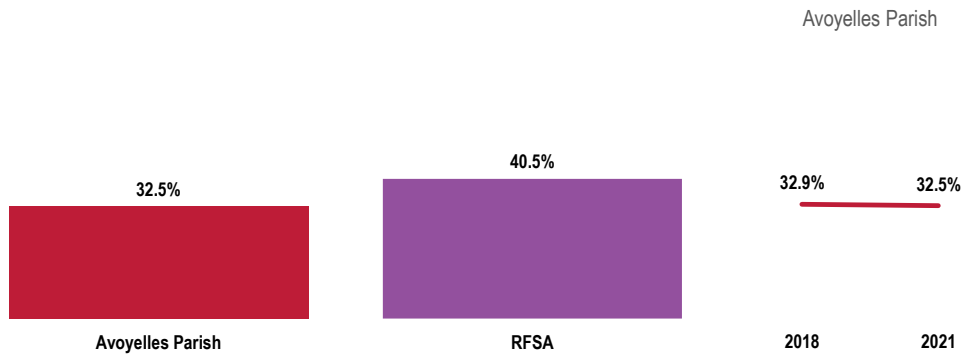

### “Often” See Others in the Community Being Physically Active

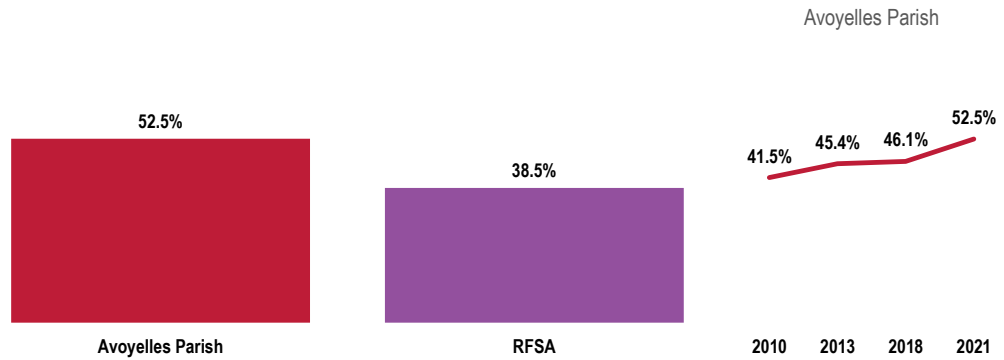

## Weight Status

### ABOUT OVERWEIGHT & OBESITY

Obesity is linked to many serious health problems, including type 2 diabetes, heart disease, stroke, and some types of cancer. Some racial/ethnic groups are more likely to have obesity, which increases their risk of chronic diseases.

Culturally appropriate programs and policies that help people eat nutritious foods within their calorie needs can reduce overweight and obesity. Public health interventions that make it easier for people to be more physically active can also help them maintain a healthy weight.

Body Mass Index (BMI), which describes relative weight for height, is significantly correlated with total body fat content. The BMI should be used to assess overweight and obesity and to monitor changes in body weight. In addition, measurements of body weight alone can be used to determine efficacy of weight loss therapy. BMI is calculated as weight (kg)/height squared ( $m^2$ ). To estimate BMI using pounds and inches, use: [weight (pounds)/height squared ( $inches^2$ )] x 703.

In this report, overweight is defined as a BMI of 25.0 to 29.9  $kg/m^2$  and obesity as a BMI  $\geq 30 kg/m^2$ . The rationale behind these definitions is based on epidemiological data that show increases in mortality with BMIs above 25  $kg/m^2$ . The increase in mortality, however, tends to be modest until a BMI of 30  $kg/m^2$  is reached. For persons with a BMI  $\geq 30 kg/m^2$ , mortality rates from all causes, and especially from cardiovascular disease, are generally increased by 50 to 100 percent above that of persons with BMIs in the range of 20 to 25  $kg/m^2$ .

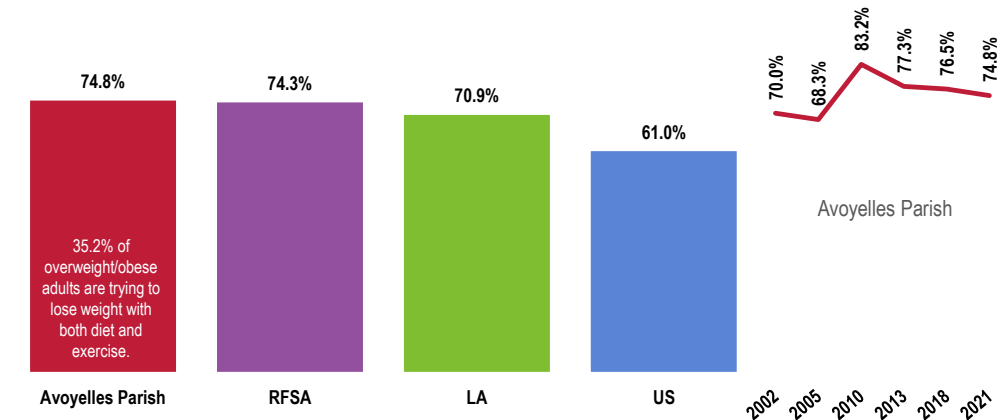

## Prevalence of Total Overweight (Overweight and Obese)

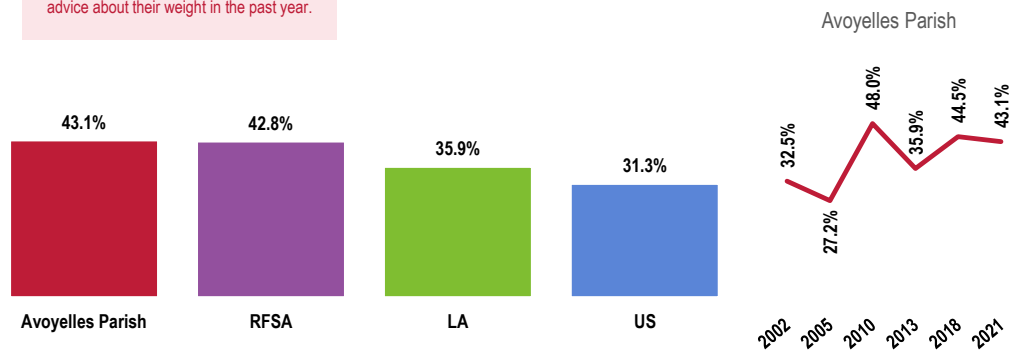

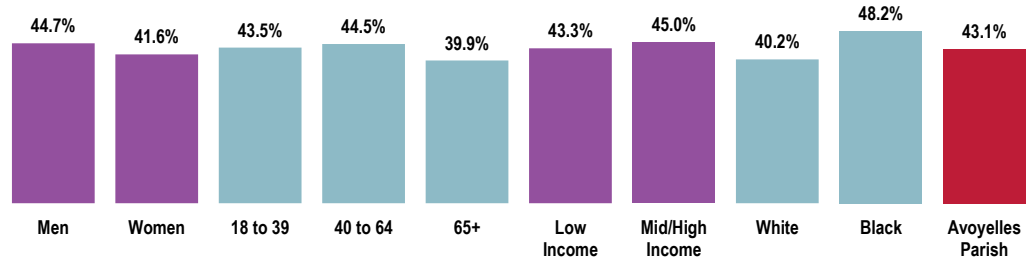

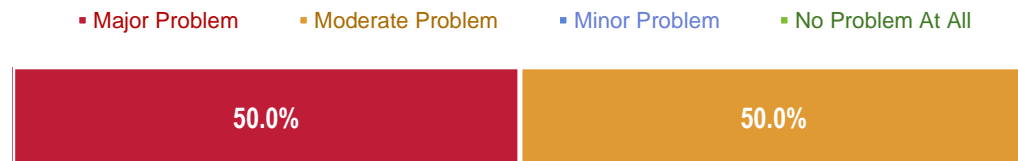

## ABOUT DRUG & ALCOHOL USE

More than 20 million adults and adolescents in the United States have had a substance use disorder in the past year. ...Substance use disorders can involve illicit drugs, prescription drugs, or alcohol. Opioid use disorders have become especially problematic in recent years. Substance use disorders are linked to many health problems, and overdoses can lead to emergency department visits and deaths.

Effective treatments for substance use disorders are available, but very few people get the treatment they need. Strategies to prevent substance use — especially in adolescents — and help people get treatment can reduce drug and alcohol misuse, related health problems, and deaths.

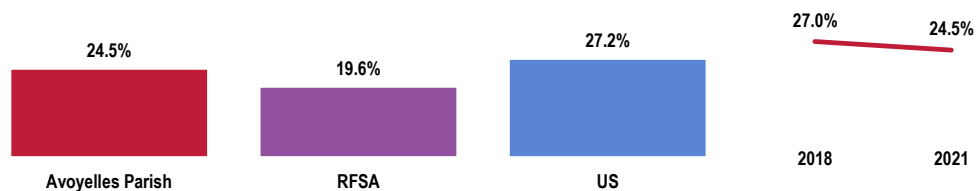

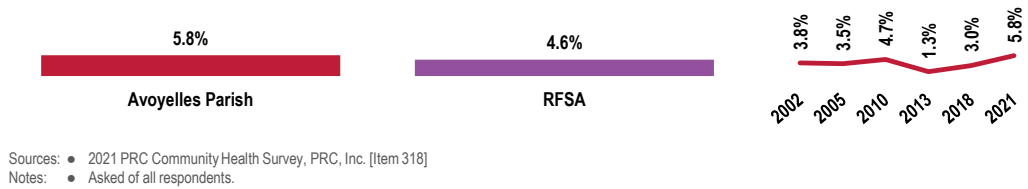

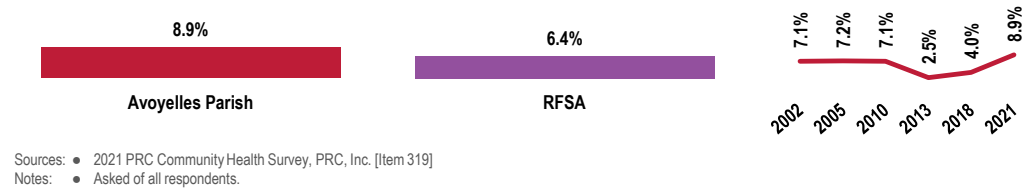
### Have Driven in the Past Month After Perhaps Having Too Much to Drink

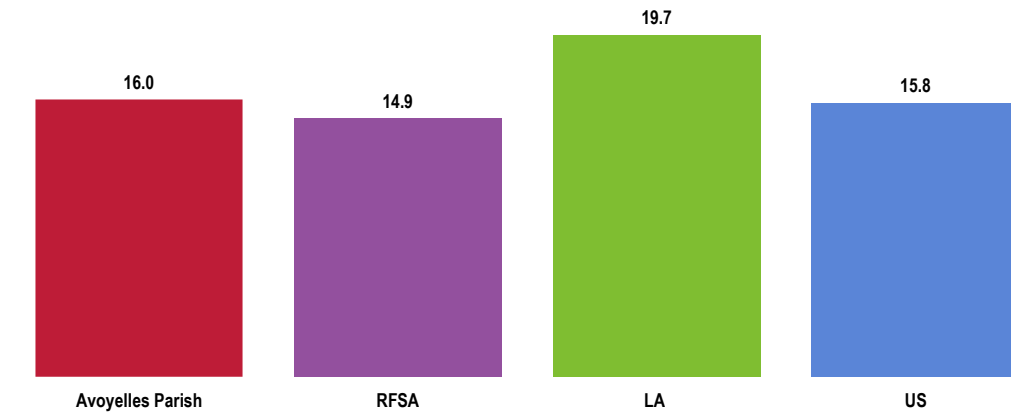

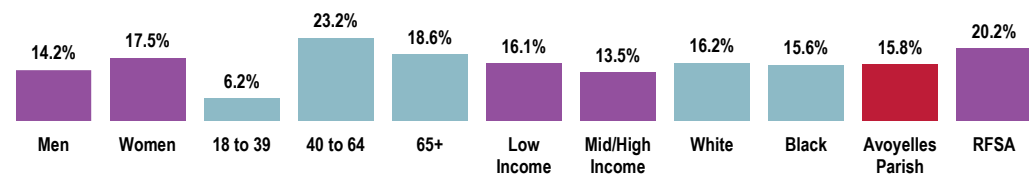

## Tobacco Use

### ABOUT TOBACCO USE

More than 16 million adults in the United States have a disease caused by smoking cigarettes, and smoking-related illnesses lead to half a million deaths each year.

Most deaths and diseases from tobacco use in the United States are caused by cigarettes. Smoking harms nearly every organ in the body and increases the risk of heart disease, stroke, lung diseases, and many types of cancer. Although smoking is widespread, it's more common in certain groups, including men, American Indians/Alaska Natives, people with behavioral health conditions, LGBT people, and people with lower incomes and education levels.

Several evidence-based strategies can help prevent and reduce tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke. These include smoke-free policies, price increases, and health education campaigns that target large audiences. Methods like counseling and medication can also help people stop using tobacco.

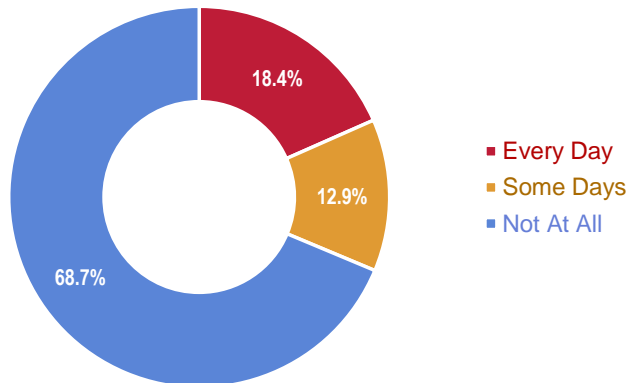

(Avoyelles Parish, 2021)



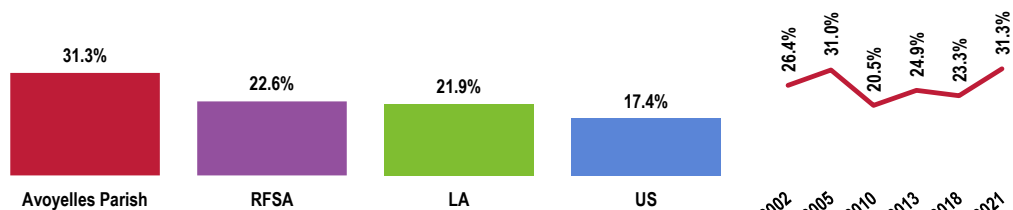

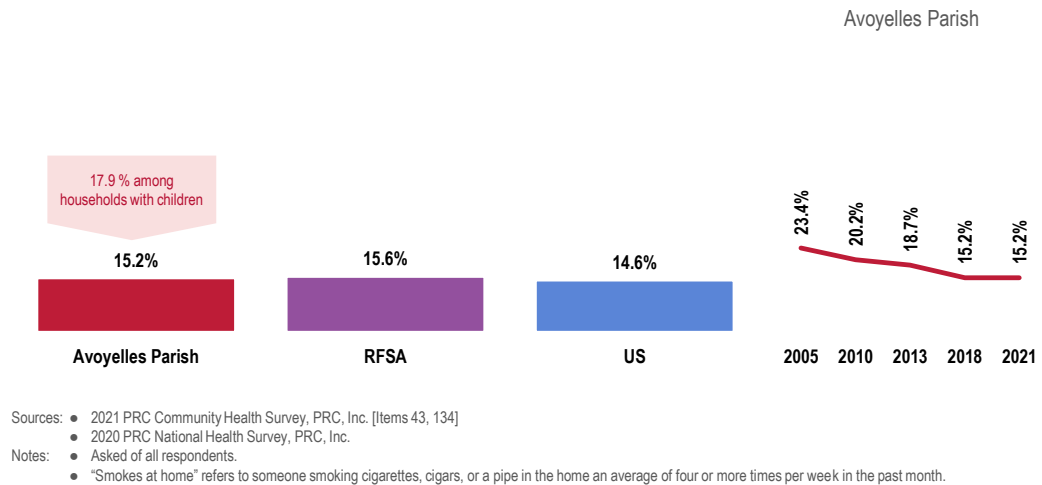

### Member of Household Smokes at Home



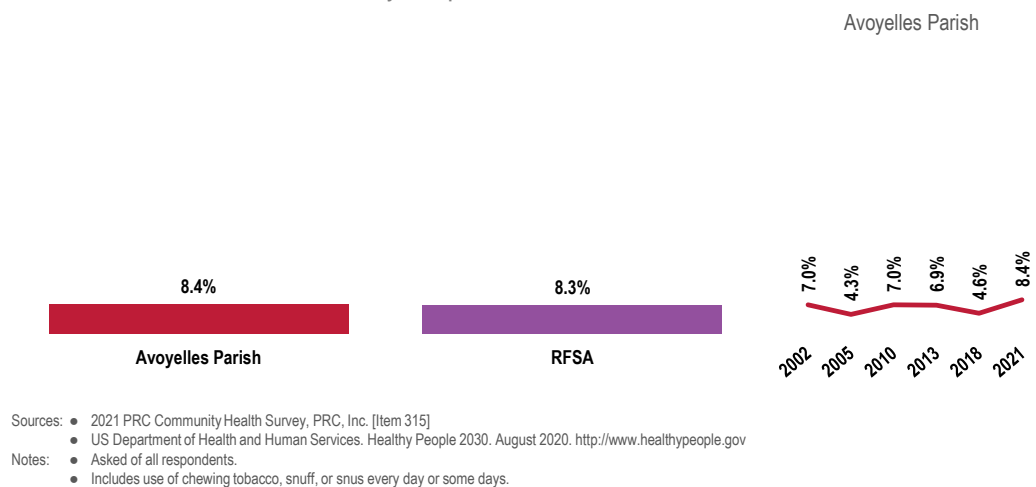

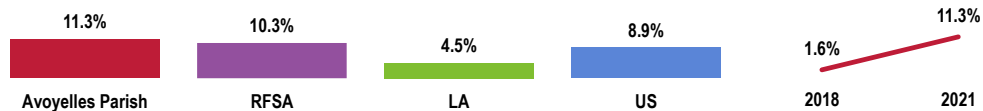

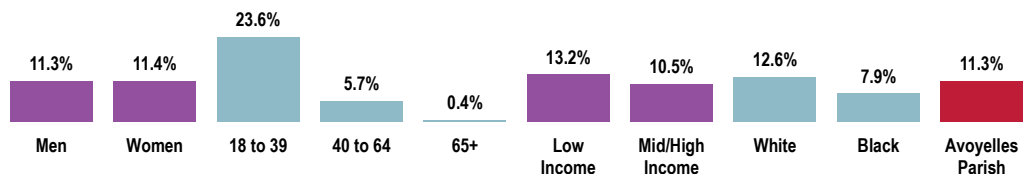

## Sexual Health

### ABOUT HIV & SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS

Although many sexually transmitted infections (STIs) are preventable, there are more than 20 million estimated new cases in the United States each year — and rates are increasing. In addition, more than 1.2 million people in the United States are living with HIV (human immunodeficiency virus).

Adolescents, young adults, and men who have sex with men are at higher risk of getting STIs. And people who have an STI may be at higher risk of getting HIV. Promoting behaviors like condom use can help prevent STIs.

Strategies to increase screening and testing for STIs can assess people’s risk of getting an STI and help people with STIs get treatment, improving their health and making it less likely that STIs will spread to others. Getting treated for an STI other than HIV can help prevent complications from the STI but doesn’t prevent HIV from spreading.

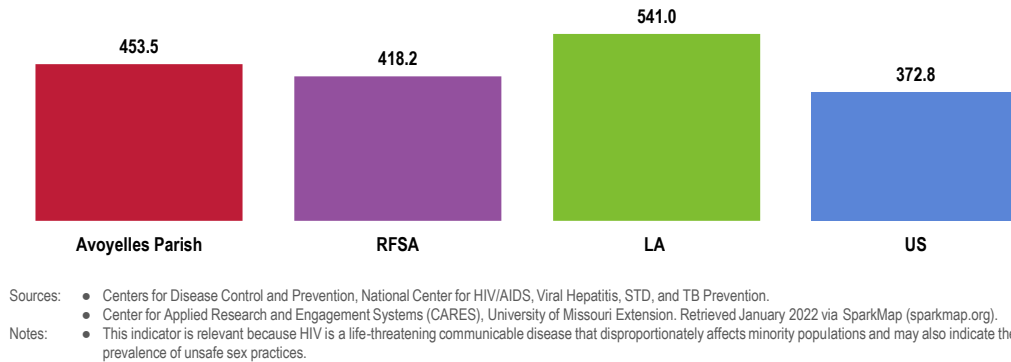

(Prevalence Rate of HIV per 100,000 Population, 2018)



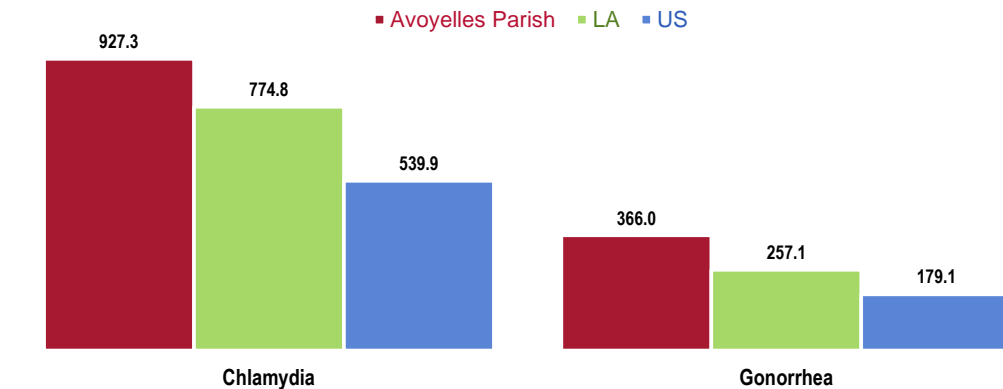
## Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs)

**CHLAMYDIA** ► Chlamydia is the most commonly reported STI in the United States; most people who have chlamydia are unaware, since the disease often has no symptoms.

**GONORRHEA** ► Anyone who is sexually active can get gonorrhea. Gonorrhea can be cured with the right medication; left untreated, however, gonorrhea can cause serious health problems in both women and men.

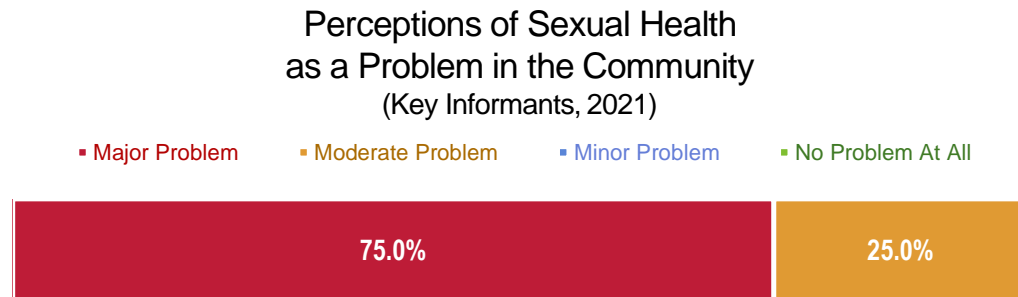

# ACCESS TO HEALTH CARE

## ABOUT HEALTH CARE ACCESS

Many people in the United States don't get the health care services they need. ...About 1 in 10 people in the United States don't have health insurance. People without insurance are less likely to have a primary care provider, and they may not be able to afford the health care services and medications they need. Strategies to increase insurance coverage rates are critical for making sure more people get important health care services, like preventive care and treatment for chronic illnesses.

Sometimes people don't get recommended health care services, like cancer screenings, because they don't have a primary care provider. Other times, it's because they live too far away from health care providers who offer them. Interventions to increase access to health care professionals and improve communication — in person or remotely — can help more people get the care they need.

## Lack of Health Insurance Coverage

Survey respondents were asked a series of questions to determine their healthcare insurance coverage, if any, from either private or government-sponsored sources.

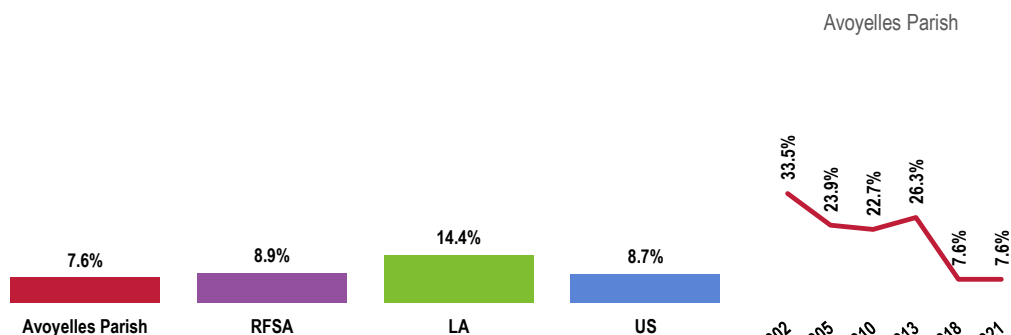
**“Do you have any government-assisted healthcare coverage, such as Medicare, Medicaid (or another state-sponsored program), or VA/military benefits?”**

**“Do you currently have: health insurance you get through your own or someone else's employer or union; health insurance you purchase yourself or get through a health insurance exchange website; or, you do not have health insurance and pay for health care entirely on your own?”**

Here, lack of health insurance coverage reflects respondents age 18 to 64 (thus excluding the Medicare population), who have no type of insurance coverage for healthcare services – neither private insurance nor government-sponsored plans (e.g., Medicaid).

### Barriers to Health Care Access

To better understand healthcare access barriers, survey participants were asked whether any of the following barriers to access prevented them from seeing a physician or obtaining a needed prescription in the past year.

**“Was there a time in the past 12 months when you needed medical care, but had difficulty finding a doctor?”**

**“Was there a time in the past 12 months when you had difficulty getting an appointment to see a doctor?”**

**“Was there a time in the past 12 months when you needed to see a doctor, but could not because of the cost?”**

**“Was there a time in the past 12 months when a lack of transportation made it difficult or prevented you from seeing a doctor or making a medical appointment?”**

**“Was there a time in the past 12 months when you were not able to see a doctor because the office hours were not convenient?”**

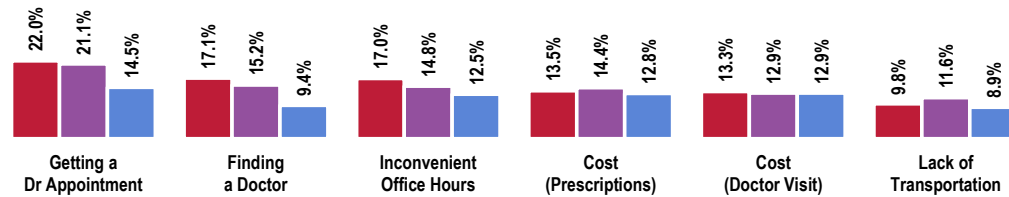

## Barriers to Access Have Prevented Medical Care in the Past Year

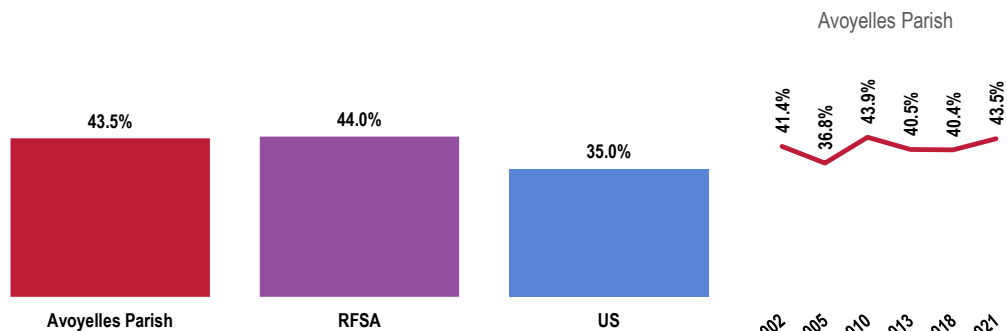

## Experienced Difficulties or Delays of Some Kind in Receiving Needed Health Care in the Past Year

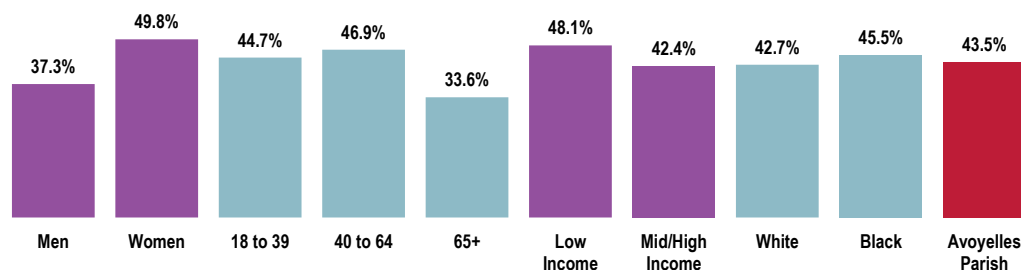

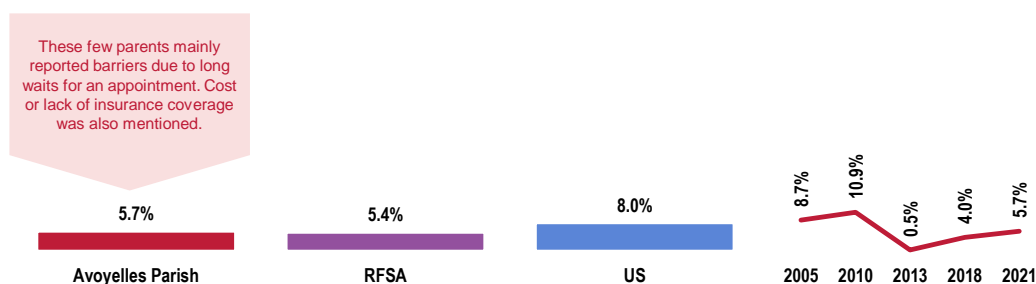

As a home health provider, we see many patients who don't have a car, a friend to ride with, or a way to pay for private transport. – Social Services Provider (Avoyelles Parish)

Lack of transportation contributes to health issues. – Other Health Provider (Avoyelles Parish)

#### Co-Occurrences

Mental health and substance abuse. – Community Leader (Avoyelles Parish)



# Primary Care Services

## ABOUT PREVENTIVE CARE

Getting preventive care reduces the risk for diseases, disabilities, and death — yet millions of people in the United States don't get recommended preventive health care services.

Children need regular well-child and dental visits to track their development and find health problems early, when they're usually easier to treat. Services like screenings, dental check-ups, and vaccinations are key to keeping people of all ages healthy. But for a variety of reasons, many people don't get the preventive care they need. Barriers include cost, not having a primary care provider, living too far from providers, and lack of awareness about recommended preventive services.

Teaching people about the importance of preventive care is key to making sure more people get recommended services. Law and policy changes can also help more people access these critical services.

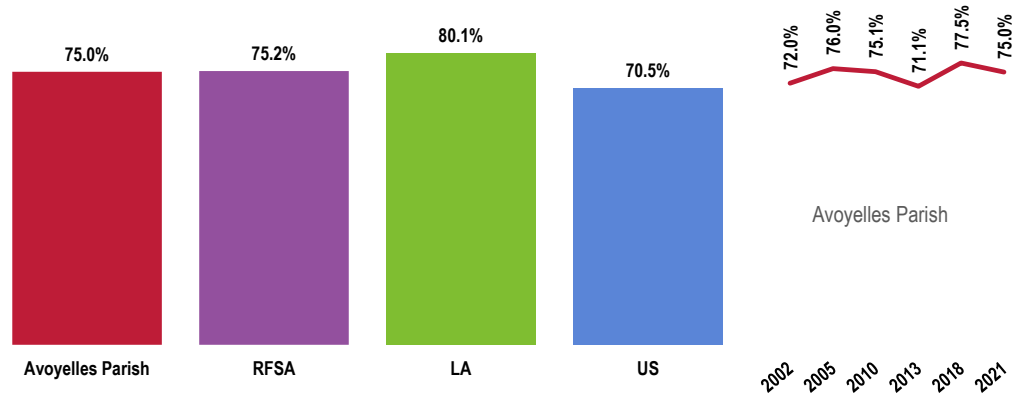

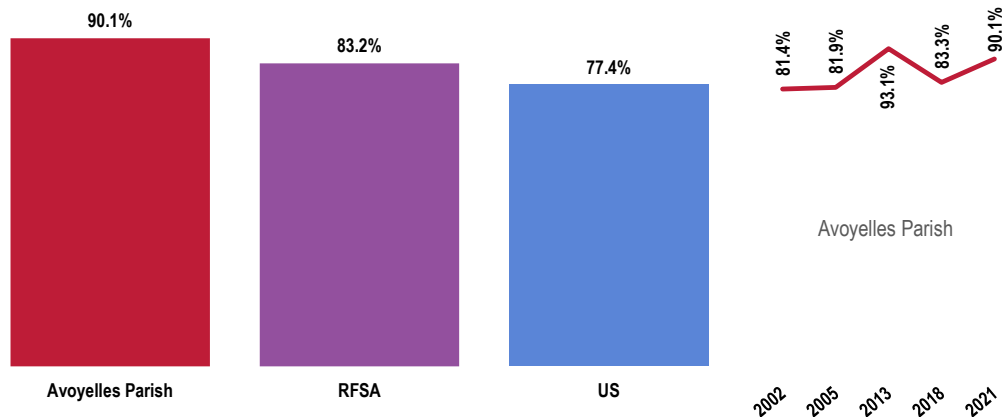
### Have Visited a Physician for a Checkup in the Past Year

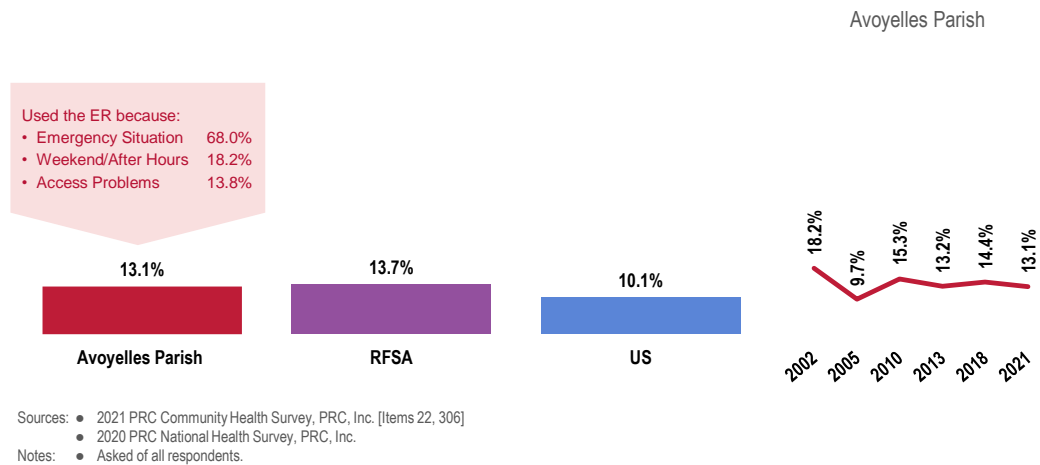

## Oral Health

### ABOUT ORAL HEALTH

Tooth decay is the most common chronic disease in children and adults in the United States. ...Regular preventive dental care can catch problems early, when they're usually easier to treat. But many people don't get the care they need, often because they can't afford it. Untreated oral health problems can cause pain and disability and are linked to other diseases.

Strategies to help people access dental services can help prevent problems like tooth decay, gum disease, and tooth loss. Individual-level interventions like topical fluorides and community-level interventions like community water fluoridation can also help improve oral health. In addition, teaching people how to take care of their teeth and gums can help prevent oral health problems.

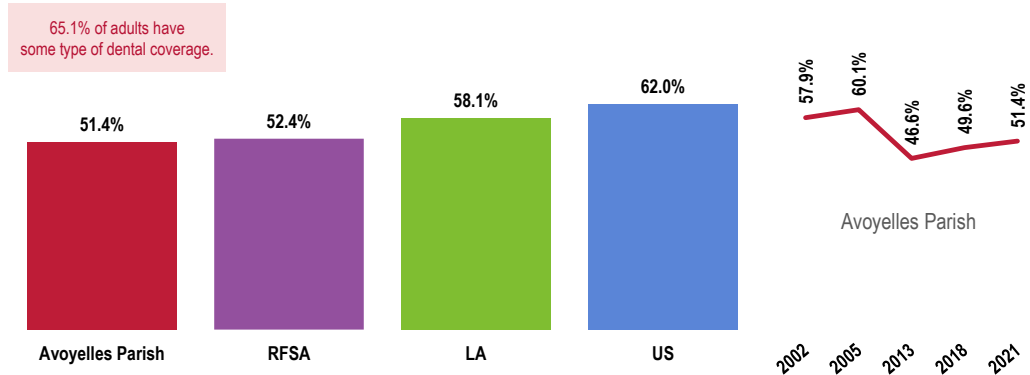

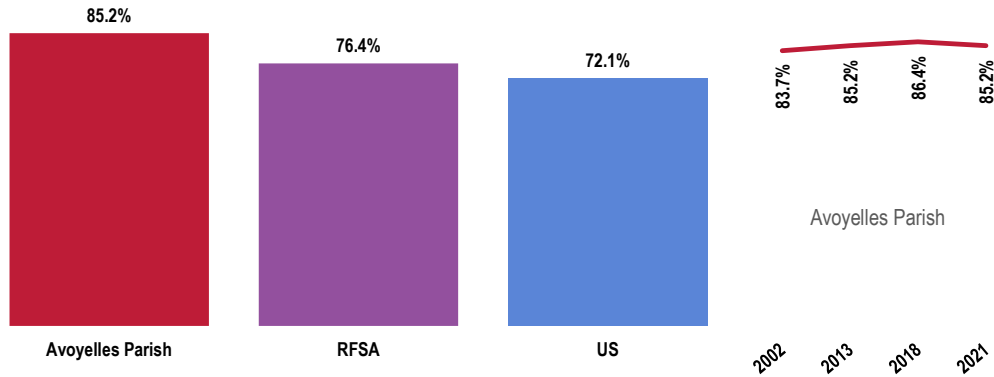

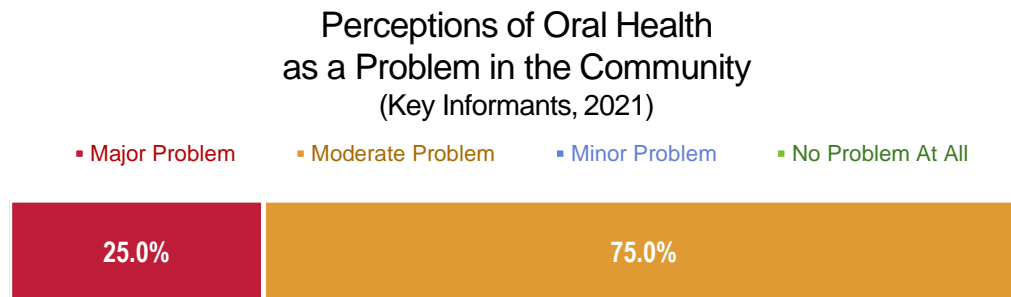

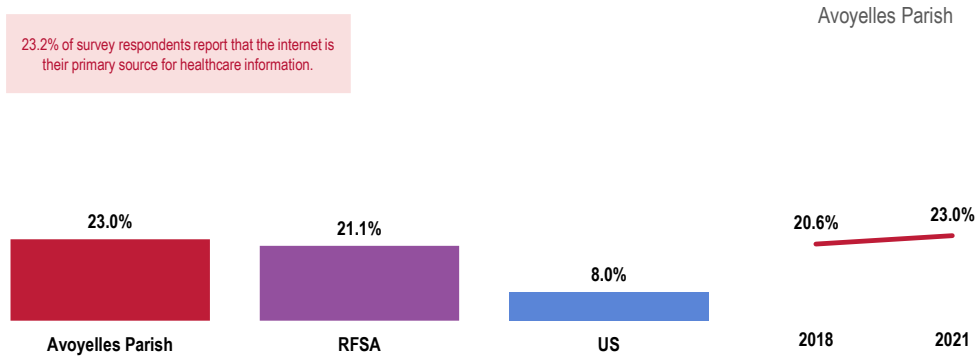

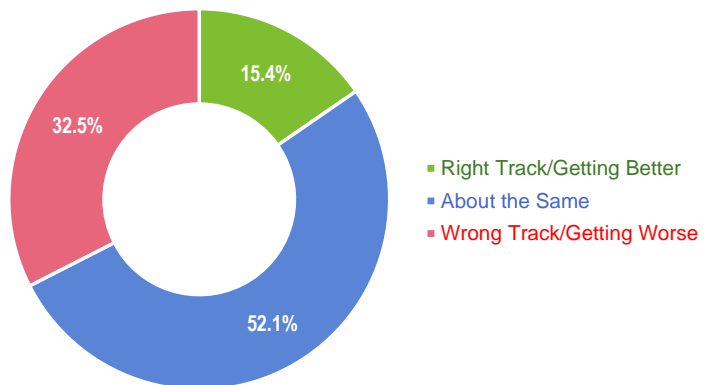

“Overall, would you say that the quality of life in your parish is on the right track and getting better, staying about the same, or on the wrong track and getting worse?”

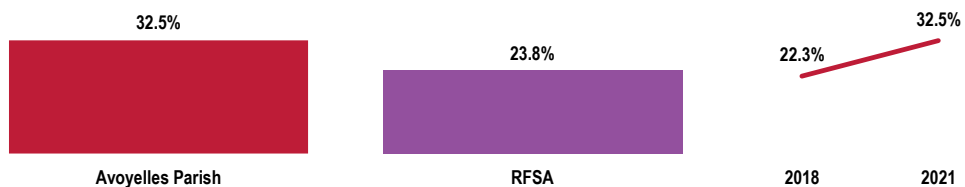
Rating of Quality of Life in the Parish

Avoyelles Parish



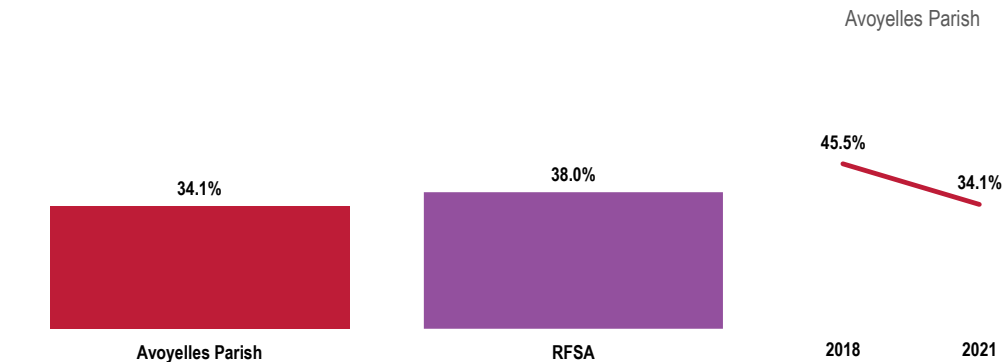

### “Frequently/Sometimes” Volunteer

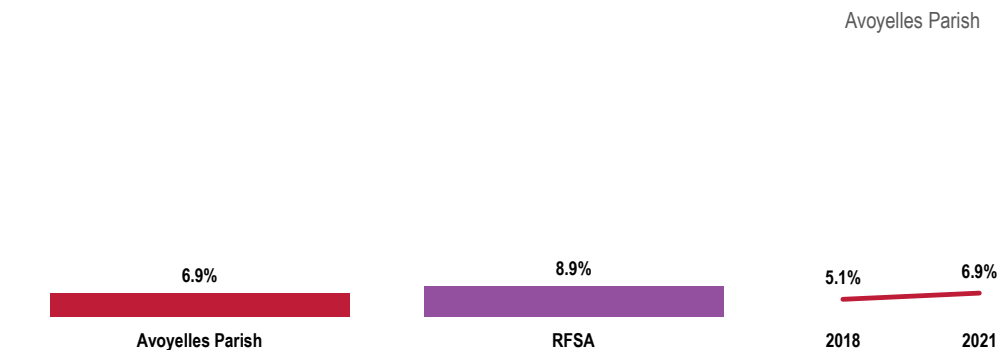
